

Dear Friends,

Welcome to another issue of this increasingly singular little magazine which flows like a winding river through the marshes of popular culture. As British and American society falls apart around our ears, culture, especially that subgrouping of which is filtered through the lens of popular opinion, becomes more and more important. And equally the bland pablum served up as culture by the powers that be becomes equally both irrelevant and even dangerous, certainly counterproductive.

I don't know why this is becoming such a smashing year for music, but I have my suspicions. There have been some great records released this year, and we are only just over half way through it.

Undoubtedly COVID has had a major effect on it all. First of all, and most pragmatically, a large proportion of artists (like the rest of us) has been forced to spend the best part of a couple of years inside left to our own devices. Add to that the fact that because of the massive changes which have happened within the this industry century, music most musicians now make their income from live performances rather than by sale of recorded music.

Also, add into the mix the undoubted fact that remarkably sophisticated recording equipment is now available for home use incredibly cheaply, and one is presented

with a set of conditions totally conducive to a whole bunch of great recordings.

But also, COVID has rebooted all sorts of things in society. I know that my life and outlook on the world has changed immensely. And I am someone who rarely leaves the house and whose eyes on the world are largely electronic.

I am not one of those men of a certain age who have not changed their musical tastes since they were in their early 20s. I was mildly shocked to see something written by a guy with whom I was at school and who played bass guitar alongside my clumsy electric guitar fumblings from nearly half a century ago, which read that he "hated" all modern music and refused to listen to anything recorded since the mid 1980s. That certainly ain't me (my favourite album of the year is the debut album by *Wet Leg* which is an absolute cracker), but some of the best music of the last few





years, since we as a species got fucked over by COVID-19 has been made by people whose music I have been listening to for much of the last half century.

"Oh no" I hear a subset of my audience murmuring, "the old bastard is going to rant on about *The Beatles* again!"

Well, sort of. Paul McCartney's *McCartney III* album which was recorded and even put together and released during the pandemic's reign of terror, is his best album for many many years. In fact, I would like to posit, it is his best single body of work since the heyday of *Wings* back in the mid 1970s. At the moment I would go so far as to say that it is my favourite Paul McCartney album since *Abbey Road*.

I follow various YouTube channels and podcasts, and am surprised to see how the 1971 Paul and Linda McCartney album *Ram* has experienced a massive resurgence of critical popularity.

Sure it has some very pretty melodies, but the vast majority of the lyrical content is facile and basically erring towards being meaningless. This has been one of the two irritating Paul's most aspects of compositional career, the other one being his tendency to release barely thought out song fragments which anyone else would just keep in the cupboard towards the time when they can be used as part of a properly thought out composition (most of the 1970 eponymous album).

McCartney III however, is a smashing collection of songs, with all the lyrics making sense for once, and all the songs being properly put together. Already it has prompted various people to suggest that this is going to be McCartney's final album of new material. After all he has just passed his 80th birthday. However, as I








reported last issue, McCartney's performance at Glastonbury Festival last month was a complete triumph whatever optic one looks at it through.


One of the other albums that I like very much indeed this year is the collaborative album between Penny Rimbaud and Youth (also a McCartney collaborator over the years, particularly as their duo *The Fireman*).

I have met Rimbaud twice, both times forty years ago. If you want to know the rather amusing backstory of my relationship with the anarchopunk band *Crass* of whom Rimbaud was drummer and cofounder along with another longtime acquaintance of mine Steve Ignorant, check out the relevant pages in Steve's massively entertaining autobiography.

Back in the heyday of punk, the two residents of an open house (later described and semi self-identifying as "Anarchists") in rural Essex formed a duo called *Stormtrooper* which soon changed its name to *Crass* after a bunch of the other residents voiced their disapproval. Over the next seven years they released a whole string of albums and singles which were recorded, manufactured and designed in house.








It was this self reliance as much as the music that impressed me highly at the time, although I mostly adopted the politics therein, and still do.

And now Rimbaud has recorded a remarkable album featuring classical and jazz stylisations together with the words, rhythms and angst of Penny Rimbaud. This is a fantastic album, and I would strongly suggest that even if you have been put off by the shouty Tourettesness of *Crass* back in the day that you also check out the rather nice album of *Crass* remixes that has also been released this year.

The music coming out of Dial House has been a very important artistic and moral influence for me for the last four decades, and it is rather heartwarming to this particular elderly gentleman that this movement is continuing. And long may it do so.




Thom Yorke has teased The Smile have new music in the works, including the recently teased single 'Colours Fly'.

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

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






more importantly whether the rest of the world will agree with Russia in the assertion, god alone knows and he ain't telling.

Are we all fucked, or is the beginning of a new dawn? Don't ask us, we only work here!

The Real Music Club has been a Brighton musical institution for over 15 years, founded by 'Judge' Trev Thoms, Tim Rundall and Stuart McKay as 'Real Festival Music' the idea was to bring the diverse styles of the anarchistic free music festivals indoors and to make sure the performers got paid. The club has always been run by a committee who decided on the acts that would be asked to play at the monthly shows and that meant that the music was as diverse as its members. I had been going to the club for a few years when Trev died and the loss of one of its founders was a bit of a setback. It did not put any shows on for a couple of months and, when I innocently said, 'You can't let it die down now' I got asked to join the committee. One of the first things I suggested was that we ran a Radio Show and we were offered a weekly slot on Brighton and Hove Community Radio - a station that Judge Trev had helped set up.

I have been doing the weekly shows for nine years now and the main ideas behind them are to promote the live Real Music Club events by playing tracks for the participating artists and to find and play new and less mainstream music. I have had many guests on the show over those nine years and I usually ask them to bring in tracks that influenced them or that they particularly like and I talk to them about new releases and how they have got started in music.

It has normally gone out live from the BHCR studio but, during the Covid crisis, I have been recording the show at home. I still, however, do it as a live show. When I do the without guests I use tracks I have found or been sent and one of the other problems of the lockdown has been that I cannot browse the shelves of Resident Records in Brighton for new music. I often take a punt on something sometimes you hit lucky and find a new 'Wow!' This is a habit I got into back in the early 70s when I lived in Barking. Just down the hill from the station was a second hand record shop which had shelves of LPs marked 'Not For Resale'. Obviously a reviewer lived in the area and was selling off the stuff they were sent. It was this way I found 'Rupert Hine', an artist I have liked all through his career and, in many ways, that find set the theme for how I seek out music for the show.



So, with all these personal and professional links, how could I not add Mr and Mrs Biffo's new project to the Gonzo Web Radio section in this esteemed magazine?





Paulo Lira de Oliveira, best known as Paulo Diniz, was a Brazilian singer and composer. Diniz started his career at 12 years old as a radio announcer. Diniz began his professional career as a singer in 1966. His most successful composition was "Pingos de amor", originally released in 1971. In the 1980s, his career slowed as he suffered several health issues, notably schistosomiasis, which caused a paralysis of the lower limbs and forced him to use a wheelchair. He died of natural causes in his Recife home on 22 June 2022, at the age of 82.



television score composer. He worked on various tokusatsu (live action film or television drama that makes heavy use of practical special effects) shows and mecha anime.




Peter B. Lowry 1941 - 2022

Peter B. Lowry was an American folklorist, writer, record producer, ethnomusicologist, historian, photographer, forensic musicologist, and teacher who dealt with aspects of popular music, mainly African-American. First teaching biology for a few

years after obtaining a Master's in zoology, he changed his focus to blues and jazz with a primary focus on the Piedmont blues of the south-eastern United States. He wrote extensively on blues and jazz music, founded Trix Records, and moved to live in Australia in later life.



Pedro Pablo García Caffi 1944 - 2022

Pedro Pablo García Caffi was an Argentine singer, stage director, producer and cultural administrator. Caffi became first known as founding member and lead singer of the folk group Cuarteto Zupay. A stage director since 1983, following the 1991 disbandment of the group in 1992 he was nominated general director of the Buenos Aires Philharmonic, then later, in 1997 executive director of the prestigious Camerata Bariloche. He directed the Teatro Argentino de La Plata from 1999 to 2002. Between 2009 and 2015 he served as general and artistic director of Teatro Colón.



Richard Taruskin 1945 - 2022

Richard Filler Taruskin was an American

musicologist and music critic who was among the leading and most prominent music historians of his generation. He wrote music criticism regularly for newspapers including The New York Times. He researched a wide variety of topics, but a central topic was the Russian music of the 18th century to present day. He is best known for his monumental survey of Western classical music, the sixvolume Oxford History of Western Music. He received several awards, including the first Noah Greenberg Award from the American Musicological Society in 1978, and the Kyoto Prize in Arts and Philosophy in 2017. He died from esophageal cancer at a hospital in Oakland, California, on July 1, 2022, aged 77.

Irene Fargo 1962 - 2022

Irene Fargo (born Flavia Irene Pozzaglio) was an Italian singer, stage actress, and television personality. She started singing as a child, and at just 11 years old she entered the Polyphonic Choir of the city of Chiari. Fargo was best known for her two second places at the Sanremo Music Festival in 1991. In 1994 she was cast in the popular variety show Domenica in, and later on became a regular guest in Paolo Limiti's television programs. In the 2000s she was given main roles in several stage musicals. She was a popular singer at weddings in Malta.





Miu Chu 朱俐靜 1981 - 2022

Miu Chu was a Taiwanese singer. She was the winner of the third season of the Taiwanese reality television show Super Idol. Chu performed at the Kaohsiung lantern festival in a concert on 12 February 2011. She also performed at Legacy Taipei. On 5 January 2021, while promoting her final full-length album released in late December 2020, Chu announced she was battling breast cancer. Her family confirmed via Facebook on 3 July 2022 that Chu died at the age of 40 after a two-year battle with the disease.



Joseph Murray Banowetz 1934 - 2022

Joseph Murray Banowetz was an American pianist, pedagogue, author, and editor, who taught at the University of North Texas. Banowetz was an expert on the music of the Russian romantic composer Anton Rubinstein.

Banowetz performed as both recitalist and orchestral soloist around the world. Joseph


Banowetz was also internationally recognized as an author and editor. His book The Pianist's Guide to Pedaling has been printed in five languages to date and is universally recognized as the authoritative reference on the history and art of piano pedaling.

Alan Tudor Blaikley 1940 - 2022

Alan Tudor Blaikley was an English songwriter and composer, best known for writing a series of international hits in the 1960s and 1970s in collaboration with Ken Howard, including the UK number ones "Have I the Right?" and "The Legend of Xanadu". Together with Howard, he also wrote two West End musicals and a number of TV themes, including the theme music for the BBC's long-running series of Agatha Christie's Miss Marple. Blaikley's partner was the translator David Charles Harris, with whom he entered into a civil partnership in 2007.







Alfred Koerppen 1926 - 2022

Alfred Koerppen was a German organist, music pedagogue, composer and academic teacher. He taught composition and music theory at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater Hannover from 1948 to 1991. His compositions focus on choral music with and without accompaniment, but he also wrote symphonies, chamber music and stage works. Koerppen died in Burgdorf on 5 July 2022 after a brief serious illness, at the age of 95. Manuel Charlton 1941 - 2022

Manuel Charlton was a founding member of the Scottish hard rock band Nazareth and was their lead guitarist from 1968 to 1990. He also produced for Guns N' Roses. After leaving Nazareth in 1990, Charlton played some solo shows on the Scottish club circuit and released his first solo album Drool in 1997. In early 2006, Charlton joined the Swedish rock band, From Behind. In March 2013, Charlton released Hellacious. In 2014, Charlton's solo albums Sharp and Sharp Re-Loaded were issued as a double CD.



Adam Wade 1935 - 2022

Patrick Henry "Adam" Wade was an American singer, musician, and actor. Wade was perhaps most known for his stint as the host of the CBS game show Musical Chairs (1975), making him the first Black game show host in the United States. He had his first musical hit in early 1960 with the song "Ruby". He starred in a stage production of Guys and Dolls in 1978, and hosted the talk show Mid-Morning LA. In 1979, he co-starred with Della Reese in a production of Same Time, Next Year. On TV he was seen in multiple soap operas. His last theatrical appearance was in 2008, touring in the play The Color Purple. Wade died on July 7, 2022, at age 87. He had battled Parkinson's disease.



Samvel Sahakyan Սամվել Սահակյան 1961 - 2022

Samvel Sahakyan was an Armenian musical artist known for his Armenian

dance music albums including Christina (1988), Anahitis (1992), Nerir Ays Angam (1995) and Non-Stop Armenian Dance (2004). Sahakyan was a resident of Los Angeles, California at the time of his death.



Alam Khan 1943 - 2022

Alam Khan was a Bangladeshi composer and music director. He found his first musical stage opportunity in a play called "Bharate Bari". He first directed movie music for the Abdul Jabbar Khan's film "Kaanch Kata Heerey". He was awarded Bangladesh National Film Award for Best Music Director five times.

> Barbara Gracey Thompson MBE 1944 - 2022



Barbara Gracey Thompson MBE was an English jazz saxophonist. Around 1970, Thompson was part of Neil Ardley's New Jazz Orchestra and appeared on albums by Colosseum. She was awarded the MBE in 1996 for services to music.

Due to Parkinson's disease, which was diagnosed in 1997, she retired as an active saxophonist in 2001 with a farewell tour. After a period of working as a composer exclusively, she returned to the stage in 2003. Thompson worked closely with Andrew Lloyd Webber on musicals such as Cats and Starlight Express. She also wrote several classical compositions. She played the incidental music in the ITV police series A Touch of Frost starring David Jason. She also played flute on Jeff Wayne's Musical Version of The War of the Worlds. Thompson died on 9 July 2022 after suffering from Parkinson's disease for 25 years.





Weddings are Expensive so We Made an Album by Pandamonium & Friends

Weddings are Expensive So We Made an Album (WAESWMAA) is the latest



release by UK DJ/Producer and occasional

Emcee Pandamonium. Released via Kamikaze Airlines Records, this was made to celebrate and raise a few funds for his upcoming wedding, in July this year, to Stacey.

The album is entirely produced, scratched, mixed, and mastered by the man himself





and features a host of top draw emcees from these shores and across the pond. There is also an appearance from a littleknown alter ego of Pandamonium, who appears as the MC on the night.

So, without further ado, let me transport you on a little journey into the album. It's not your average album review so, feel free to expect the unexpected...

So, picture the scene, our man Pandamonium is deeply involved in plans for his upcoming wedding. Part of this is raising some much-needed funds in these days of rising costs. One night, as he lays in bed, about to drift off to sleep, his mind is on how his music can help him raise funds. He then falls into a deep slumber and begins to dream...

A laid-back boombap sound of piano, bass and drums heralds a dream like no other. There is a stage here and lots of guests sat around at tables. Heads are nodding to the jazzy piano vibe as Pandamonium's American alter ego steps on stage to greet everyone and to give them a Welcome To The Show, and that show is the future wedding reception for Daniel and Stacey. The guests have their appetites whetted as a stunning list of guest performers is noted and, as the guests clap their approval, Pandamonium takes up his place behind the turntables and Kryptik (from Paisley, Scotland) steps on stage ready to Step Up and take

the mike. The beat kicks hard and is heavy on the string sound and there is no pussy footing around here as it's all about getting ya heads nodding. Kryptik speaks, on his no-nonsense style, on the ups and downs of life the last couple of years and his desire to step up and keep moving forward, no matter what. This is a message to everyone of us, because every time we step up in the face of adversity, it's a defining moment that shows the true strength of our character. Next to take to the stage alongside Pandamonium is Killa Complex from Long Beach California. The vibe is an upbeat sound of guitars, drums, hand claps and xylophone notes to keep the crowd moving. Killa Complex asks everyone to Never Judge a Man as he explains that you can never judge anyone you meet. Someone's appearance, how much money they have and so on is never a true reflection of that person's back story and what they have lived through. Whatever your first impressions of a person are, get to know the real person behind the mask before you speak on how they may or may not be. The message might be deep here but, as a guest, you will meet many people on a wedding day, a lot you will not know so, the message is poignant. The sound now morphs into a more soulful mix of drums and piano. Ontario emcee Es takes to the stage delivering vocals for the happy couple and everyone as he asks How Long is long enough? When two people make a commitment to each other, for love, they wish to be together forever but how long is forever? Is forever enough? Can that commitment, that love for each other extend beyond the physical timescale we call forever...

As the guests ponder over the meaning of forever and love, Pandamonium's alter ego takes to the stage to entertain us for a short Interval. A groovy organ sound floats into the awareness of the guests as they are informed that Long Beach Emcee Dizzy Dustin is setting up for his performance...

With the legendary figure of Dizzy Dustin ready to go the air becomes electric as the

guests ready themselves for the Sink or Swim Remix. The track was originally released by Diz in the run up to the release of the *Where Do I Go From Here?* album, Pandamonium's remix is a pounding beat and synth sounds that immediately has everyone out of their seats, bouncing to the groove. Dizzy Dustin treats everyone to some slick wordplay that is all about integrity. In life you have to do what you gotta do on life's journey but, in all that you do it's about being upfront and speaking your truth and not being fake or dishonest. With the crowd suitably buzzing, long time Pandamonium collaborator One OZ. (Edinburgh, Scotland) steps up to the Mic. Panda and OZ have this great chemistry in everything they do so when the guitars and heavy drum beat drops, you know you're in for a treat. In his typically unapologetic rhyme style, One OZ spits a gritty and witty story that is all about upping your game. If you wanna step up and stand shoulder to shoulder with others in the game, you have to Get Ya Weight Up and show em what you got, prove you deserve your place. As the night draws to a close, it is the turn of Sir Burbia (London, England) to bring a bit of fun to round off the evening. The musical backdrop is a funky sound of guitar, keys, and drums. Sir Burbia drops some slick, 'just for fun' lyrics, that echo the US TV Show Keenan & Kel, as he explains his love for a certain beverage with, I Do (Love Orange Soda). This one will have everyone grinning ear to ear, and you can't round off a party in a better way...

A horn-heavy jazz Funk sound hits as Panda's alter ego takes to the stage one last time to Wrap Up things. He gives everyone a little more information as the guests prepare to leave.

However, not everyone is ready to go just yet and the cry rings out for One More (Encore) and so just to send all the guests away in style, that's just what Pandamonium gives them. An instrumental style joint in a boombap style that is piano heavy and full of cut up samples to get everyone nodding their head one last time. Then Panda switches it up one last time and changes from pianoheavy to a guitar-heavy vibe midway through. This all serves to allow the guest to leave on a proper high, this in turn allows Pandamonium to return to being Daniel and for him and Stacey to finally settle into married life. just as Pandamonium awakes from the dream that has just given him the perfect theme for an album...

Did it really happen that way? I dunno but, it sounds good right!

Overall, you can't say much more about this album than it is a solid production album that is undoubtedly a highly enjoyable and has been produced by someone who has a love of good Hip Hop music and who has the respect of his peers enough to feature such a talented line-up of guest emcees.

You can really get into the whole vibe of the album feeling like a wedding reception that most Hip Hop lovers would want to be invited to. Pandamonium's production is as faultless as always and puts his years of expertise and experience to good use creating an album that flows so well from top to bottom, keeping you entertained all the way. The guest artists he has brought on-board for this all give those 'top of their game' performances, just what you'd want at a wedding reception.

There is definitely a family affair vibe about this project to as the family have been involved in producing a very limited number, twenty actually, of CDs to help raise some funds for the actual wedding in July 2022. The artwork is all custom hand produced, numbered, and signed. So, if you want one of these then I would advise you move quickly as they won't be around long.

There is not much left for me to say except a huge thank you to Pandamonium for sending this over and sending him and Stacey best wishes for the up coming wedding, See Ya There...






and definition of beauty and luxury whilst redefining, re-examining, and re-evaluating consumerist ideals."

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LAUREN BORHANI – THE NOT OKAYS

I was at the Written By Wolves gig last year, stuck at the end of the bar scribbling away, and this lovely young lady came up to me and asked if I was Kev? That was the start of a wonderful friendship not only with Lauren but her husband B and even her parents, and I have been known to share the odd tipple with her father Clive. With The Not Okays releasing a series of singles and becoming more active on the live circuit, now seemed the right time to ask the important questions and get more of an insight into her and the band.

Who, what and when is Lauren Borhani?

I'm just a girl whose music taste is clearly stuck in the mid-2000s. As long as I can remember I've had this same big fringe, the same winged eyeliner and the same taste in music.





I grew up in Christchurch and moved to Auckland in 2014 when I landed my dream job – at 19 I was in the directing team of 3News (now Newshub/ Discovery), which still feels crazy to me. I've been incredibly fortunate to work in television, publicity, and public relations (PR) for the past nine years. Working in the heart of entertainment and media for almost a decade has been incredibly fastpaced and rewarding, and the television shows, campaigns, and events I've worked on feels nothing short of a dream come true. Quite simply, I love my job. PR is all about telling stories and connecting with people, and what we're trying to do with The Not Okays feels like a natural extension to that.

In 2019 I was diagnosed with depression and anxiety, and in 2021 I was finally diagnosed with ADHD combined type after a long, hard road of advocating for my mental health. It's been an incredibly challenging few years, and I'm so blessed to have such a strong support system in the form of my husband, family, and friends. And now that I feel like I'm through the worst of it, all I want to do is talk about it and help alleviate the stigma around mental health to help others have an easier path ahead than I did. *The Not Okays* is about screaming from the rooftop that it's totally okay to be not okay sometimes, especially after what's been a few really shit years for everyone with the pandemic.

What are your earliest musical memories and who/what inspired you to start singing and what motivates you now?

I've always loved music, as a little tot I was putting on performances in our living room to Britney Spears and The Spice Girls. My first concert was Truebliss, followed by Brooke Fraser, so I guess I've always been inspired by women on the stage. I remember there being a lot of music in the house when I was growing up. My Dad was a bassist when he met my Mum, and he continued to play his guitar through my youth. Whenever my parents hosted their friends, they played music DVDs of The Eagles, Eric Clapton, and John Farnham- so I'd think of Kiwi onion dip anytime I heard Hotel *California* for a while there.

My Dad always encouraged my music – he got me into guitar lessons, and then keyboards when I didn't like guitar so much because the strings hurt my fingers. He bought my first two keyboards and would always make me play piano and sing for his friends. I lost inspiration for music for a while there, I had to choose between musical theatre (NASDA) and television (Broadcasting School), and the telly won! I gained an incredible career, an even more incredible husband, and now that the fire has been sparked under me again, I'm letting the music become a bigger priority to me.

I'm constantly listening to my favourite emo shit (Paramore, Bring Me The Horizon, Fall Out Boy, Panic At The Disco, A Day To Remember, All Time Low...) and a heap of my favourite female vocalists (Hayley Williams, PVRIS, Olivia Rodrigo, Dua Lipa). It's a really cool time to have found inspiration, and I really do owe it all to my husband's encouragement, patience and talent.

How did you get involved in musical theatre and what did you enjoy most about it?

My lovely mum took me to a drama course when I was in primary school, and it didn't take long for me to become absolutely hooked. Through my primary and secondary schooling, I was cast in about 30 live productions, which saw me star as characters like Dorothy in The Wizard of Oz, Snow White, Veruca Salt in Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and Susan in The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe. I more and more loved the productions where I got to sing, I found it really fun and challenging! Eventually I also fell into choir at high school and expected to travel to compete nationally every year.

There was a real community in these productions and competitions, and I found that I really enjoyed interacting with the audience at the end of the show. It's always been an absolute pleasure to entertain, but I found it a lot easier when it was performing something I hadn't written. Singing has always brought me a lot of pleasure, but it's taken me a little while to silence the self-critical voices and finally see where this thing can go if I give it my all. I feel fortunate that I get to work with the incredible talent we have in The Not Okays. We all have our strengths and



above all else, we're really good friends, which makes it so much easier to be vulnerable and create together.

How did you become a DJ? / How did you meet Bahador?

Okay, so I've been a cheeky little dickhead here and combined Kev's two questions, even when he was very specific about his questions (which are genuinely some of the most interesting I've ever been asked, the man's good), because this is The Tale of Two Emos and it's pretty good.

In 2015 I went to my first festival, which was Westfest at Western Springs. I'd never been to too many big concerts because I grew up in Christchurch and none of the shows I really wanted to see would travel down. However, I moved to Auckland at 19 when I got my dream gig straight out of Broadcasting School (in the directing team of 3News/Newshub/ Discovery), which meant I finally got to take advantage of live music as often as I should.

That week I was working on the morning show, Firstline, which meant 3am alarms for a couple of weeks, and to this day I have no idea how I managed that! However, I soldiered on, putting on my most emo face mid-week and heading straight to the Ding Dong Lounge stage. I'd never heard of Ding Dong Lounge, but every single one of the artists I wanted to see were playing were on that stage only. So, I stayed put, and watched in awe as my world turned a little bit more emo with Escape The Fate, Falling In Reverse, Papa Roach and Fall Out Boy all playing live in front of me for the first time. The next time I was in town, you best believe I made a beeline for this Ding Dong Lounge place.

From the second that I walked down those famed stairs it was like I was in high school again. Panic at the Disco! blasting in town, followed by some 80's rock ballad and straight back into Linkin Park. I was home, and I remembered just how much I loved this. I kept going back, and eventually I became single for the first time in my adult life, and then went to Ding even more. The first time I went there single I met my now husband Bahador , and the more I got to know him the more I was intrigued -- I really liked the guy behind the great hair. He was smart, he was creative, and DAMN his "band is actually pretty good aye" (my first ever Facebook message to Bahador haha).

We started talking every day, and dating, and then within 11 months we were engaged. His proposal was beautiful, he got on one knee on Christmas day in front of my whole family-- which is one of the reasons I put my Christmas tree up on Halloween last year, I JUST LOVE CHRISTMAS. Now here's the kicker, Ding Dong Lounge tends to put up incredible photos each night, so just for curiosity's sake I looked back at the album from the first night I ever became a Ding Dong Lounge convert-- and guess who was the DJ that made me fall in love with the place? My now husband.

When B and I started dating, I became the girlfriend of the DJ -- and then we started DJing together, and then he got too busy to carry on with it as often, so I kept on doing it while he achieved incredible things with his band Written by Wolves. So here I am, the girl that now DJs the emo nights and does it with huge dancefloors. I love playing the unexpected alongside the expected, like The Kill or Helena into Don't Trust Me or Kids of 88's My House. And through this, I've seen this whole new generation of emo kids appear out of nowhere, and boy they love Bring Me The Horizon.

And do you know what? So do I. x

How did The Not Okays get together in the first place (and why is B not playing guitar)?

The Not Okays came together to play at one of Ding Dong Lounge's Emo Nights. B





and I had been DJing together for a year or so, and we were both ready to achieve two of our big goals at the same time.

B is a crazy hard-working genius. Not only does he play guitar for the epic Written By Wolves while shooting, editing and directing their music videos, he also draws houses full time (www.studio-b.co.nz!), but he wanted to add being mean at drums to that list. So, he bought an electric kit and taught himself how to play, and with every show he's getting better and better. It's safe to say he's achieved being mean at drums.

Meanwhile B had been encouraging me to sing since we first started dating. I'd lost my confidence in performing publicly, but with B's support I was finally ready to get back on stage again. It's really special to be able to perform with my husband and adding really good friends to that mix who all love the same emo shit as us is honestly a dream come true.

We played with a few friends tapping in and out based on their other band commitments (love u Aaron R, Kurt, Tal and Scott!), until we realised it was time to support Caitlin in picking up the bass again. Obviously, Noriel was already working with Aaron and B on MIRA by this point, and he was the natural choice for the second guitar. Thus our line-up was formed!

What does each person bring to the band?

Lauren Kate Borhani – Vocals

Listen, I'm just a big old emo. On top of being Auckland's unofficial Emo DJ, I've also fallen into the role of unofficial band manager. I've been lucky enough to work full time in live television production, publicity, and PR for the last nine years, so I have a little black book of contacts and love finding win-win opportunities to work together with them. Apparently, I'm a bit of a control freak, and have taken on the role of developing our brand, our socials, our communications, and our publicity. My favourite part about this is that I get to scream from the roof how talented my friends are!

Aaron Prictor - Vocals/Guitar

I also like to call Aaron our Creative Director. He produces and records all our songs and is the driving force of our songwriting and sound. He's a wickedly talented live musician too, and is a trusted session musician and live tech. He's the reason we sound the way we do, and he holds us all to account!

Noriel Wong - Guitar

Noz is a super smooth guitar player, but what he is even more is a quick-witted little shit. He's our Social Media Manager and is the creative genius behind those timely emo memes. He truly is one of the greatest shitposters I've ever had the pleasure of meeting, and he's a huge asset to the band. Noz went to high school with Aaron, too!

Caitlin Clark - Bass

Caitlin is our band Mum (which is great, as Daddy Prictor plays the Dad role real well). She always ensures everyone is well-fed and on point and is honing her songwriting skills alongside Aaron. She has a solid taste in music and sneakers and has the biggest heart in the world. And she's a smooth driver on the bass, it's super cool to be able to play with her again, as we first played together in high school.

Bahador Borhani - Drums

B is the second driving force behind our songwriting and sound. He's also an incredibly talented content producer and does most of our design elements (think logos and videos), in addition to producing, shooting and editing all our music videos with my support when he's too busy being a creative genius on another big project. B is obviously my husband and father of our two fur babies too!

What were the original plans for the band? (I get the impression it was initially a good-time party band with no real intentions).



I don't think we could have predicted what this band would develop into. It started as a covers band to headline Ding Dong Lounge's infamous emo nights and has grown to a content-creating emo powerhouse with everything produced in -house. The Not Okays is obviously a play on My Chemical Romance's *I'm Not Okay*, and while we did question whether we should change it as we launch into originals, it feels right for what we want to do and what we want to say.

We're seeing the start of an emo revival with the likes of My Chem and Panic! At The Disco releasing new music, and a new Paramore album on the way. The Not Okays is about paying tribute to those who got it so right before, while normalising conversations around mental health along the way. It's totally okay to not be okay, so long as you talk about it.

Why did you feel inspired to cover Avril Lavigne for your debut single? Why that song?

I'm a pop-culture nerd, and Avril Lavigne's revival out of nowhere completely shook me (and the band) to the core for a few reasons.

- Bite Me was Avril's way of announcing her signing to DTA Records, which is Travis Barker's label. You can his hear elevated pop-punk influence, and it was a really exciting taster of what was to come. This sounded so much like the authentic Avril a lot of us had missed since her Let Go album with the likes of Sk8r Boi, Complicated, I'm With You etc... and I think a lot of people were missing that authentic sound and this single hit the spot.
- Travis Barker was at the time dating Kourtney Kardashian (they've since gotten engaged and now married), so it was clear this revival was going to get mainstream A-List media attention. This may sound stupid to some people, but that's just the way the media works.
- Listen, it's a banger. It was a hint of our type of music being taken seriously by a mainstream audience, so if there was a time for us to go in, now felt like our best shot. We were in the middle of Auckland's neverending fourth lockdown and were all going a bit stir-crazy, so it was a

great distraction. Additionally, I had finally been diagnosed with ADHD after 27 years of struggling with the symptoms unaware and unmedicated, so I had never felt more driven to finally make my dreams a reality and kick this beast of a band off with my favourite people.

Your next single, *Better Days*, was not only an original number but you also edited the video. Talk us through the process for this and how did it come together?

We were incredibly humbled by the warm reception to *Bite Me*, and knew we had to quickly follow this release up with an original so people would take us seriously. It's easy enough for musicians to cover a song but writing and sharing original content is the hard and vulnerable bit. The song itself was written by Aaron and had sat on the notes on his phone for a few years. He graciously thought The Not Okays was the best home for this track, and we quickly got to work recording vocals and planning the video.

At the time, my husband Bahador was slaving away on Written By Wolves' next music video. As many may know, my very talented man produces, directs, shoots, and edits the majority of Wolves' videos-- but what they don't see is how much work he puts into them for months and months at a time. I knew that the only way we were going to get a music video for this song is if I put my Broadcasting School degree to good use, rolled my sleeves up and produced and edited this bad boy.

So, I sourced the studio and the lighting, B sourced the camera, and we spent a long hard day getting the content shot (little did I know while I was fighting the start of a Giardia infection while on-set, and would spend the next week hunched over the toilet bowl — ugh). Over the coming weeks while he was down one end of the house creating a yet-to-be-released masterpiece for Wolves (it'll blow your mind), I was on the other end of the house editing together Better Days. B tidied up the post-production, and we released our baby into the world. It was a very collaborative process, and everything was done in-house.

What is next for The Not Okays, and when are we going to hear more original materials?

We've just laid down the very first vocals to our next single which (bugger it I may as well give you an exclusive because I love you) is called *Sleeptalk*. We'll be shooting the music video in the coming weeks, led





this time by Bahador with the Creative Direction of our good friend Samantha Davies. If you wanted to hear *Sleeptalk* for the first time, then we'll be fumbling our way through the demo live this weekend at CrushFest (Saturday 9th July at The Tuning Fork, tickets still on sale at <u>Moshtix</u>!) Otherwise we're going to be announcing a headlining show very soon, where hopefully you'll be able to hear one of the three original demos currently in development. I really hope people watch this space, because we're really excited about what's to come!

Where can people go to find out more about the band?

All the key info is on our website (<u>www.thenotokays.com</u>), and keep an eye on our <u>YouTube</u> for the music videos as they go live. Otherwise if you want all the latest news as it hits (plus a heap of self-deprecating memes) check out our <u>Instagram</u> and <u>Facebook</u>. We're on a heap of streaming services too, so feel free to give us a follow there too! (Spotify, Tidal, Apple...)

The Not Okays are a great band, and I am so looking forward to catching them at Crushfest on Saturday, it's going to be a fantastic day.






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




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
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
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ED WAAKA *E KURA* INDEPENDENT

It did not take long for me to fall in love with this song, probably the first 30 seconds I guess, as there is something about it which grabs hold of the listener, puts them in a safe place, and lets the singer bare their soul. Soul, yes, this is full of it in a musical sense as well as an emotional one, and when I discovered he was singing about the upcoming birth of his first daughter, whether he would be a good father, and the need to reconnect to his Māori heritage it made a great deal of sense. Part of that reconnection was to write the song in Te Reo, and for that he needed some assistance so asked his cousins Stephanie Fong and Dr Jennifer Martin to help. Ed says, "Writing a song in Te Reo with whanau is one of the most uplifting and humbling experiences of my musical journey so far. I searched the piano for inspiration while we spoke of childhood memories. Three hours later we had a finished song."

I was not surprised to see that Ed has worked with Troy Kingi in the past, as there are definite elements here which are reminiscent of his slower ballads, but I did not expect to be reminded so much of Aro given they are a male/ female duo, but the harmonies are sheer delight. There is so much space here, so much restrained power, all of which combine with the emotions pouring out which make this something very magical indeed as we are taken away from our daily existence to a very special place. Play this on headphones, preferably on repeat, and feel the stress of daily life just wash away as Ed connects not only with his unborn child and his heritage, but to every single one of us.





AYLA WELSEY SAY TO ME INDEPENDENT

Normally, when I am reviewing singles for MNNZ the turnaround time we work to is 7 days and it is not unusual for me to work on far tighter deadlines than that, but Ayla was incredibly well organised with the promotion for her second single, and I have been playing this for the last 3 weeks at least. In that time it has become a real earworm, and I have even found myself singing it as I walk around (not a pleasant experience for anyone in the vicinity, let me assure you). She describes herself as an indie folk/rock artist, but I don't hear a lot of folk in this one, but lots of power pop, commercial rock, guitars, a great voice, wonderful arrangement and stacks of hooks.

There is something about this song which is bouncy, full of fun, and packed with the summer sun and is fresh, inviting, and a solid blast. With a full band behind her, special attention has been paid to the arrangements so there are times when she is harmonising with herself, others when she is a cappela, while we can have thumping drums or delicate rimshots, the band sitting back or coming forward to drive the song on. The result is a rock/pop single which surely is destined to sit on radio playlists and the charts, as this is a blast from beginning to end and something I have enjoyed immensely. Apparently, Ayla has been gigging in Tauranga and Auckland but so far I have missed her, and that is something I need to correct immediately if not sooner. I thoroughly enjoyed her debut single, Salamanders, but this takes her songwriting and performance to a whole new level. Now when are we going to get an album?



TIA WARD ME AND ME TOO EP INDEPENDENT

This is the debut EP from Hawkes Bay singer Tia Ward, following on from two singles which were released ahead of time, Under Wraps and Paint Dry, both of which are included here. The first thing which the listener notices are her vocals, which are both understated yet firmly to the fore. She has a very warm and inviting style which allows the listener in, with each song firmly coming from a pop background with modern production and sounds. What makes this somewhat different is that here is a musician who is a musical magpie, bringing in bits and pieces from many different genres, yet to settle, which in some ways is both good and bad. It is good in that she is undoubtedly talented, with a vocal style which can be used in many different areas, yet bad as there is a real risk that listeners may really enjoy one style and not another, so the EP is quite up and down in that respect.

There is no doubt that the highlight for me is What's Wrong With Me? which starts off gently before turning into a rather sedate pop rock number. She allows herself to put a slight edge on her voice, and while the drums are basic, the guitars and bass are solid, and the result is a number which is a really nice summery blast. But following that is Panic On The *Highway* which is completely different in that it has a reggae and calypso feel and also contains a rap section. While I can appreciate the skill and songwriting which has gone into this, this is not something I would play for listening pleasure, while I would the number previous, and I am sure the reverse will be true for other listeners. After that is 80HD which is solid Eighties pop, even down to the synth drums intro and while it is very clever indeed it is again different to what has gone before and the same situation may arise.

The production is excellent throughout, and I am sure Tia is going to be a name we hear more of but having such a mix of styles means it is probably going to cut down on the audience she so obviously deserves.



TRYONICS FRAGMENTED INDEPENDENT

Tryonics is the solo project of Hap Richardson, formerly of My Little Pony, Go Victim, and Freezer Child. It is completely a one-man affair as Hap not only provided all the music and vocals but also recorded and mixed it as well. When I asked him for a press release, he told me there wasn't one, but that the album was recorded in a remote far north shack surrounded by Māori land, an attempt at country, from an experimental, post-rock musician more used to the density of the city. In that respect this 9-track 19-minute -long album is a success as the post-rock influences are very strong indeed, and while I would not think of this as country in the traditional sense there are strong elements of alt-country and some additional nuances here and there which reinforces the country connection.

As one can tell from the album length, some of these songs are quite short, with only one breaking the three-minute barrier (closer Morning After), while there are a couple under a minute. Opener Free Range really sets out his stall as it is packed with alt-country styles yet there is also a heavily distorted and fuzzed guitar right at the front which probably has more to do with grunge than what one would normally associate with the more sedate genres, but then that is taken over by a filthy steel which takes distortion and slide to a new level, and one can easily imagine MC5 having fun with this. Contrast that with the next song, *Chasing Tail*, which is far more sedate and even contains some interesting falsetto harmony vocals, yet is only 53 seconds in length. This segues into Can You Dance and originally, I felt it was a section change in a song as opposed to a new one, such is the way it sneaks in.

One often gets the impression that he is hitting the strings on his acoustic quite hard, much more in a rock manner than a country, and because he is coming into the genre from the more experimental post-rock area, he has no issue at all with adding keyboards and electric guitars in a way which would not normally be considered. This album is probably too far out in left field for country fans but will be of interest to those who want their rock to have more colour and be different to the norm.



DANICA BRYANT CRUSH INDEPENDENT

Here we have the lead single from Danica Bryant's forthcoming EP, Ego Death, and if this is fully representative, then that is something to look out for. For a young artist she has already had considerable success, mentoring with Bic Runga while also gaining a support slot for Elton John on his 'Farewell Yellow Brick Road' tour, and while she has already tasted success on the NZ Hot Singles Chart, I am sure this is going to head the same way. This is one of those sweet pop numbers which has a rock edge, hooks aplenty, but while it sounds as if butter would not melt in her mouth, Danica is actually singing in the chorus, "You're the type of man I'd only like to crush".

Her lyrics are wonderful as they contrast so strongly with the sweetness of the sound being created. The focus is very much on her vocals, but the arrangement is excellent with nuances added here and there, while the use of double and triple tracking on the vocals works very well indeed. There is also plenty of space, with the song containing different sections which reset the ear, allowing Danica to really provide emphasis on her vocals. For me the only downside is the percussion which does not push the song along like it should, but that does feel like nitpicking in a number which is a real earworm with lyrics many women I am sure would relate to. She is touring from the end of August through September, and if you want pop with sweet vocals which has a real edge and is lyrically deep then that should not be missed.



ANGE.MAC + SHAUN GAREA EP INDEPENDENT

What we have here is the debut collaboration from Ange.Mac and Shaun Garea. Ange.Mac has been making experimental industrial/ambient music since 2006 and can also be seen playing with his thrash/black metal/hardcore/D-Beat Punk band Bloody Hell while Shaun has just returned to the scene after a gap of about 10 years but was previously in the hard rock band Dezmadore. Even before getting into the music, I could see this was an interesting collaboration, as only two of the five tracks are by both of them. One was jointly written, performed solely by Shaun and produced by Ange.Mac, and then there are two completely solo performances.

However, the EP does not feel as fractured as one might imagine, but instead is incredibly cohesive, and while dark ambient is at its core there are also plenty of other influences being brought in at different times such as industrial, avant-garde, gothic, experimental, new age, and others. Based on keyboards, some songs have vocals, and while some can be relaxing and pleasant there are others which are more challenging, almost invoking the likes of Gridfailure or Krautrock. This is powerful stuff, music which demands to be listened to on headphones so none of the nuances are missed as there is a lot going on while at the same time it can be felt to be almost somnambulant at times. This is music created to take the listener into another space, mostly pleasant, but not always, and although some of the underlying repetitive this is just themes are undertaken to create a framework for other threads being woven over the top. These guys are currently working on the soundtrack to the forthcoming Doom Pilgrim tabletop card game by Czech



developer Warclaw Games and I sincerely hope that means we are going to be hearing much more from them as this 30+ minute long EP is well worth investigating by those who want their music to be thoughtful and interesting while also being way out in left field, far from the mainstream.



BUBBLEMATH TURF ASCENSION CUNEIFORM

It took fifteen years for Bubblemath to produce their excellent second album, 'Edit Peptide', but it has only been five for them to release their third, 'Turf Ascension', which we should all be grateful for. There are less Cardiacs influences in this one, more Gentle Giant plus King Crimson, and a definite switch to the more melodic and less challenging while losing none of the quirkiness and charm one finds within their music. this Apparently, was a deliberate approach on behalf of the band who felt that possibly they spent too long on their second release, due in no small part to setting up their own recording equipment which allowed them to spend as much time as they liked without worrying about cost or being kicked out of the studio.

Just four songs, but only one of these has the temerity to be less than 10 minutes in length (by three seconds), yet when one falls headlong into the world of Bubblemath time has no meaning, as all that exists is their creation. While there are times when I am reminded somewhat of the commerciality of some 90s' American prog, for the most part we are firmly in the UK with bands from the 70s and 80s but being lifted into the modern day and taken in new directions. It is eccentric, but somehow with more prog mainstream sensibilities so it is a very album to get inside and quickly fall in love with. I was talking to a musician the other day about his latest track, and he soon stopped talking about that and had I heard the latest release by Bubblemath? His feeling is that their songwriting has improved by light years from what they were doing on the debut album, but as I have yet to hear that I cannot really comment, except for saying that this is yet another exceptional release.

There are multiple threads, multiple melodies, all taking place at the same time, and it is an album where the listener concentrates on just one of these and it is only then that the real complexity comes out.

For example. the drumming on "Everything" is a masterclass on what can be done behind the kit when the drummer wants to be a true musician as opposed to "just" keeping time, with James never stopping and always changing the attack and approach, but the same is true for every musician on every song which makes this such a dynamic and interesting album to listen to. Let us hope they keep producing material according to the new equation, so if this album was released in just a third of the time of the last one, I think the next one should be due out in 20 months? Please?? For those who have yet to uncover the sheer delights of this incredible Minneapolis quintet, then the time is now.



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THE COMPLETE GOSPELS

The Gospels evolved because Rick Wakeman was asked to perform at an organ recital to raise money for the Camberley United Reform Church, which was in desperate need of a new organ. Rick pondered what to play and the more he thought about it and what the evening should mean, the more he felt that something very special was about to take place.

Thoughts of the New Testament kept creeping into his mind and he decided to write an instrumental piece to the settings of the four Gospels. He began working but after a couple of hours realised that there was no way he was going to get across the feelings he wished to portray without singing. The music seemed to cry out for an operatic tenor.



Amazingly enough, just a few weeks earlier, Rick had met the famous tenor Ramon Remedios at a charity concert in which they both performed and he plucked up courage to ask him if he would kindly agree to perform the New Gospels with him. The concert was a tremendous success and Ramon's feeling and understanding of the music moved many people to tears.

The complete Gospels is a limited edition box set containing all the known recordings of the project both audio and visual. Along with a reproduction A4 x 12 page concert program.

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WHERE IT ALL WENT WRONG

On August 23rd, ex-Sex Pistols' front man John Lydon, aka Johnny Rotten, lost a court case against two of his fellow band members, Paul Cook and Steve Jones, about the use of their material in the forthcoming Disney miniseries, directed by Danny Boyle.

Read that sentence again. In less than 50 words I've managed to sum up all that's gone wrong with the British punk scene. As if punks using the courts to settle disputes amongst themselves is not enough, it's over a miniseries being paid for by the Disney Company.

Lydon's been going downhill for a long time now. In 2004 he appeared in the reality TV series I'm a Celebrity...Get Me Out of Here! in which generally minor and failed celebrities compete with each other to eat kangaroo's testicles and the like, while isolated in the Australian jungle. In one live broadcast he referred to the show's viewers as "fucking cunts," showing that he still had the capacity to shock. It was a cheap stunt, probably planned months in advance, which helped to revive his flagging career as a professional controversialist.

In 2008 he took part in a TV advertising campaign for Country Life butter, dressed

in the kind of clothes that are usually reserved for the squirearchy, the British landowning elite. Was this meant ironically? It's hard to say. The campaign was a great success and earned Lydon enough money to restart his post-punk band, Public Image Limited.



In 2012 he appeared on an episode of Question Time, a long-running BBC current affairs program, in which members of the public ask questions of a panel of guest speakers and politicians. He came over as embarrassing, self-promoting, loud, pointlessly argumentative, frequently talking over other guests, and expressing attitudes which would certainly have upset his former self.

In 2018 he was photographed wearing a MAGA t-shirt, and in 2020 said that he was planning to vote for Trump. (He became a US citizen in 2013.) He told the BBC's Newsday: "Yes, of course, I'm voting for Trump. I don't want a politician running this world anymore." In November that year he was interviewed for Good Morning Britain, saying that his support for Trump was meant as a rejection of "intellectual, left-wing ideas." Many viewers were puzzled as to why the political views of an ex-pop singer, now living in the USA, would be of interest to them.

And now we find him using the courts to

defend himself against the opinions of his former band mates. John Lydon's descent into irrelevancy is complete.

It hadn't always been this way. The Sex Pistols are regarded by some as one of the most important bands ever. They came out of the London pub rock scene of the mid-1970s. Influenced by the pared-back aggression of such bands as Dr Feelgood, and the style and stage-posturing of Ian Dury, as well as by the burgeoning New York scene, they brought a new attitude to rock, at that time burdened with an overweening sense of self-importance. Prog rock and pomposity was the order of the day, with long, technical guitar solos pretentious lyrics wedded and to overblown orchestral arrangements and classical themes, in the style of The Moody Blues.





Martin Springett was born in Crayford, Kent, England, in 1947. He studied art (that is he learned to play the Guitar) for two semesters at the Brassey School of Art in Hastings, Sussex. 
In 1984 Martin was commissioned to illustrate the cover of "The Summer Tree" by Guy Gavriel Kay. This and the subsequent volumes of The Fionavar Tapestry Trilogy were published around the world along with Martin's covers. Martin continued his work in fantasy illustration, illustrating many covers for fantasy novels, including "The Traveller In Black" by John Brunner. In 1990 he illustrated his first children's book, "Mei Ming and the Dragon's Daughter" written by Lydia Bailey. Martin has just finished illustrating his sixth children's book, called "The Follower" by Richard Thompson. He has been nominated for various awards, including the Governor Generals Award For Illustration. He has won the Aurora Award For Excellence in Fantasy Art, and two Silver Awards from the Art Directors Club of Toronto and Best Classical Record Cover of The Year Award (UK).

Martin still pursues the Musical Muse, recently producing a new CD, "Blue Evening" with his band "FREEFALL", an independent, instrumental album called "Rough Magic"; a collection of explorations on the guitar, and a collection of tunes inspired by the writings of Guy Gavriel Kay called "Bright Weaving".

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
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


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The Who and I

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


