
But I am quite pleased with the way that it is evolved over the last 643

issues, and I'm very pleased that we have kept it going for so long, and that we intend to keep it going for at least the foreseeable future.

As always, this week's editorial is mirroring one of the things that just happened to me in my own ongoing journey through life, and the more obscure sectors of popular culture. Since my wife died and I have been being looked after by my old friend and colleague Graham, I usually go to bed much earlier than I did when I was able bodied, and I spend hours each evening pushing around on my iPad, reading books, listening to music, and perusing websites.

And for the last few years, most of the editorials that I've written in this particular space are inspired by things that I have discovered during my evening ramblings.

And something that never ceases to surprise me is that there is so much that passes me by despite the fact that as a long-standing music journalist and book reviewer I am allegedly on the mailing lists of all the people who produce stuff





For example, it was only last week that I discovered that Pink Floyd had released a new remix of the 1987 album *A Momentary lapse of reason*. In 1987 I was working in a Group Home (see above) as a Team Leader, which is what the powers that be decided to rename Staff Nurses in National Health Service owned group homes, for the people who were still then named the mentally handicapped, in order to make the





whole thing seem less institutional.

It didn't really work, merely instituting the framework of one wellestablished hegemony for another equally well established one. I could have told them that it wasn't going to work, but as a whole bunch of professionals, who were much higher up the foodchain than me, had already said this to them, and had been randomly ignored, I didn't bother.


I was always seen by the powers that be, and my coworkers alike, as a completely out to lunch and quite possibly dangerous influence on the status quo, and I didn't think that anything that I said was ever going to change that.

So, I carried on doing what I always did until they threw me out a couple of years later.

In those days, brothers and sisters, there were still small record shops in every little town as well as in the big cities, and in the pretty little market town in which I was working (Crediton)

There was one shop selling new records and another, with a very silly name, selling secondhand ones, and during the few lunch breaks I actually got, I frequented both of these. And one day in the first half of 1987 I went up the road to the shop selling the new vinyl, and I bought a copy of the new Pink Floyd album. And when I got home that night, I couldn't wait to put it on my turntable.

Now, for years, I pretended that I liked it. But, in fact, I only liked one song. It came over to me as an embarrassingly cynical attempt to



make a commercial record with a gloss of Pink Floyd characteristics. As I read more about it, despite the credits on the sleeve, I found out that the only member of the band to be on it consistently was the guitarist David Gilmour.

I discovered through the grapevine that drummer Nick Mason was in the process of undergoing some sort of emotional crisis which left him unable to play the drums, and that keyboard player Richard Wright who had been sacked from the band during the 1979 sessions for the double album *The Wall* was back as a hired hand, but neither Richard or Nick had actually contributed very much to the album. No wonder I didn't like it.

Nick Mason later wrote: "In hindsight, I really should have had the self-belief to play all the drum parts. And in the early days of life after Roger, I think David and I felt that we had to get it right, or we would be slaughtered."


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
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
As I said, the only track I liked was a Celtic sounding using on side two called *On the Turning away*.

In contrast, when I went to the same record shop some weeks later and bought a copy of the Roger Waters album *Radio KAOS* I loved it, and still do. In fact, I love it more than its creator, and more than the vast majority of Roger Waters fans. In fact, I would go so far as to say that to me it is the highlight of Roger's solo career. But, I am digressing. Back to the Pink Floyd album.


Without making too much of a song and a dance about it, Pink Floyd have re-issued the album in a completely new format. There is what has been described as a "Radical" new remix. I wouldn't go that far, but it is noticeably different. Large chunks of the original drumming that were done by, whoever they were done by (and I am dictating this onto my iPad in the car park at Lidl and I have no access to the Internet so I can't check my facts) have been redone by Nick Mason and the brakes and fills are certainly more authentic Pink Floydesque than are the original version. Peculiarly, some of the keyboard bits seem to have been remixed or even re-recorded and certainly sound more like the work of Richard Wright. How they did this I'm not sure, as Richard Wright has been dead to some years. I suspect, although I have no way of proving, and can't be bothered to check any more than stating my suspicions in this editorial, that some bits from the Endless River have been recycled again, and that this was a convenient way of getting more authentic Pink Floyd sounds onto the album. The Endless River is, of course the Mish Mash mostly instrumental album put together by Mason and Gilmour a few years ago from outtakes that were still languishing in the archives.








Again, I cannot prove it, or – to be more honest – I could've proven it, but I really can't be arsed - there seems to be a lot more acoustic guitar strummetty strumming on the album, than there was on the original, although this could purely be down to the mix. I don't know, and can't be bothered to find out. But it does change the dynamic of the whole of the album, and change it for good. However, the one thing that it doesn't change is the most of the songs are not very good. Gilmore is a mediocre lyricist, which is why so many of the songs with his tunes and Roger Waters is vicious and bilious lyrics were so successful on an artistic level. And why his more







recent songs, written with lyrics by his wife Polly Sampson are so good.

I am afraid I like words. Of course tunes and musicianship are fundamentally important but if the words and the delivery of them is below par then they do not appeal to me. I have always said my favourite band in the world would be ABBA, with Tom Waits providing both the vocals and the lyrics. What a fuck off amazing band that would be.

So how does the new remix affect the position of this album within the canon of Pink Floyd work? The sad answer is that he doesn't really. The new mix is a great improvement on the old, but the songs are still crap, and it *still* doesn't come over as anything apart from a cynical commercial cash in, and a way to try and underline the ownership of the Pink Floyd name against a far superior concept album by their erstwhile Bass Player.

#### Sad but true.

I hope that you enjoy this issue. We have certainly enjoyed putting it together, and I will see you in a few weeks time.



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



#### **Christopher Fifield** 1945 - 2025

Christopher Fifield was an English conductor, classical music historian and musicologist based in London. From 1982 until 2022, he was music director of the Lambeth Orchestra. Fifield was also known to the classical music listening public for his concert intermission talks from The Proms and other broadcasts. Fifield died on 19 January 2025, at the age of 79.




#### Bob Kuban 1940 - 2025

Robert Kuban was an American musician and bandleader. In 1964, he formed the group Bob Kuban and The In-Men, later better known for his 1966 No. 12 pop hit, "The Cheater". Kuban died from a stroke on January 20, 2025, at the age of 84.

#### Garth Hudson 1937 - 2025

Eric Garth Hudson CM was a Canadian multi-instrumentalist best known as the keyboardist and occasional saxophonist for the rock band The Band, for which he was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1994. Hudson was the last living original member of the Band, and died in his sleep at a nursing home in Woodstock, New York, on January 21, 2025, at the age of 87. #### Kaajee Singh 1945 - 2025

Kaajee Singh was an Indian Gorkha percussionist. Singh began his career in 1952 with the Maaruni dance. In 2022, he was awarded Padma Shri by the Indian government for his contribution to music in Madal (a Nepalese folk music instrument). Singh died on 21 January 2025, at the age of 80.



#### Johan Slager 1946 - 2025

Johan Slager was a Dutch musician best known as the original guitarist of rock band Kayak. He left the band in 1982 after nine albums, and returned briefly for a couple of performances in the 1990s. During and after his time with Kayak, Slager played with many other Dutch artists. Slager died on 22 January 2025, at the age of 78.



Marriza හෙရල් 1967 - 2025

Marriza (born Thein Zaw) was a Burmese rock singer-songwriter known for his contributions to Myanmar's rock music scene. He gained recognition for composing and performing his own original music, standing out in an era when cover music was prevalent in Myanmar's music industry. Marriza died on 23 January 2025, at the age of 57, after a prolonged illness related to kidney disease.



#### Buddy Brock 1953 - 2025

William Calhoun "Buddy" Brock Jr. was an American country music songwriter. His biggest hits to date are "Watermelon Crawl," 1994, which made the Billboard Hot 100 as a dance remix; and the 1992 song "There Ain't Nothin' Wrong with the Radio". Brock died in Mount Juliet, Tennessee, on January 24, 2025, at the age of 72.

#### Gianfranco Manfredi 1948 - 2025

Gianfranco Manfredi was an Italian singer-songwriter, composer, author, screenwriter, actor and cartoonist. Manfredi debuted as a singersongwriter in 1972 with La crisi, an




album filled with political and social themes, and since 1974 he was also active as a songwriter for other artists. He died on 24 January 2025, at the age of 76.



#### Kazuyoshi Akiyama 秋山 和慶 1941 - 2025

Kazuyoshi Akiyama was a Japanese conductor who held conducting posts of symphony orchestras in Japan, Canada and the U.S., such as the Tokyo Symphony Orchestra from 1964 for life, the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra from 1972 to 1985, the Syracuse Symphony Orchestra from 1985 to

1993, and the Hiroshima Symphony Orchestra from 1998. Akiyama died from pneumonia on January 26, at the age of 84.




#### Malcolm Peyton 1932 - 2025

Malcolm Cameron Peyton was an American composer, concert director, conductor and teacher. Peyton received awards from the Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Norlin Foundation. Peyton died on January 26, 2025, at the age of 93.




#### Susan Alcorn 1953 - 2025

Susan Alcorn was an American composer, improvisor, and pedal steel guitarist. She was known for a personal style influenced by free jazz, avant-garde classical music, Indian ragas, Indigenous traditions, and various folk musics of the world. Though mostly a solo performer, Alcorn also collaborated with numerous artists. Alcorn died of natural causes at her home in northeast Baltimore on January 31, 2025.



#### Wojciech Trzciński 1949 - 2025

Wojciech Stanisław Trzciński was a Polish composer, arranger, pianist, guitarist, conductor and music producer. He was the artistic director of festivals in Opole and Sopot, and one of the originators of the Polish Phonographic Industry Award Fryderyk. Trzciński later founded a private, independent art center, Fabryka Trzciny. Trzciński died on 1 February 2025, at the age of 75.



#### Sal Maida 1948 - 2025

Salvatore Maida was an American bass guitarist. He was known for his work with Milk 'N' Cookies, Roxy Music and Sparks. In 2014, Maida authored the memoir Four Strings, Phony Proof, and 300 45s. Maida died due to complications of a fall in New York, on February 1, 2025, at the age of 76.



André Ducret 1945 - 2025

André Ducret was a Swiss singer, composer, choir conductor and teacher. As a teacher at the Collège Saint-Michel, he developed methods for reading music. He also founded the Chœur des XVI, which he directed from 1970 to 2018. Ducret died on 1 February 2025, at the age of 79.



Peter Bassano 1945 - 2025

Peter Bassano was an English conductor and trombonist. In May 2012, Peter featured in BBC TV's Franceso da Mosto's Shakespeare in Italy. Bassano was the author of two books, Shakespeare and Emilia and Before the Music Stopped. Bassano died on 1 February 2025.



John Crosse 1941 - 2025 John Crosse was a British radio DJ, presenter and continuity announcer, known for being one of the voices of the Yorkshire Television region of Independent Television for nearly 30 years. He worked on Yorkshire TV until he retired in November 1998. Crosse later resided in the United States, and died in January 2025, at the age of 83.



#### Gene Barge 1926 - 2025

James Gene Barge Jr. was an American tenor and alto saxophonist in several bands in addition to being a composer. He was a founding member of the 1960s band The Church Street Five, and in the 1970s, he continued to produce as well as arrange records. He also acted in several movies. Barge died at his home in the Bronzeville neighborhood on the South Side of Chicago, on February 2, 2025. He was 98.



#### John Roberts 1944 - 2025

John Roberts was an English musician. He is best known for his musical collaborations with Tony Barrand as Roberts and Barrand. The duo was also half of the related act Nowell Sing We Clear. Roberts also had a solo career, was a member of the trio Ye Mariners All, and performed regularly with upstate New York's Broken String Band. Roberts died on 3 February 2025, at the age of 80.



#### #Paul Plishka 1941 - 2025

Paul Plishka was an American operatic bass based at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City where he appeared first in 1967 and last in 2018, in 88 roles and 1672 performances. He also sang at leading houses internationally. Plishka died at a hospice in Wilmington on February 3, 2025, at the age of 83.



Stéphane Picq 1965 - 2025 Stéphane Picq was a French composer of video game music, primarily for ERE Informatique/ Exxos and Cryo Interactive. Picq first began composing in 1987. He retired from the industry in 1998, but returned to composing for the MegaRace reboot. Picq died in February 2025, at the age of 59.



Song Dae-kwan 송대관 1946 - 2025

Song Dae-kwan was a South Korean trot singer. He often appeared on the KBS 1TV Golden Oldies. In 1965, he moved to Seoul and became acquainted with Oasis Records, becoming a singer, and released an album in 1971, though it was his 1975 album that brought him success. Song Daekwan died from a heart attack on February 7, 2025, at the age of 78.



#### Howard Riley 1943 - 2025

John Howard Riley was an English pianist and composer who worked in the jazz and experimental music idioms. From the 60s to the 80s, he enjoyed a long career of composition and collaboration. Riley also taught at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and at the Goldsmiths, University of London. Riley died in Beckenham, London on 8 February 2025, shortly before his 82nd birthday.



# Edith Mathis 1938 - 2025

Edith Mathis was a Swiss soprano known for her roles in Mozart's operas. Mathis recorded operas, symphonies and oratorios with the leading conductors of her time. She recorded many of Bach's church cantatas, and Lieder by Mozart, Schubert, Schumann, Richard Strauss and Hugo Wolf. From 1992, she taught Lied interpretation at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna and in master classes. Mathis died in Salzburg on 9 February 2025, two days before her 87th birthday.




#### Maria Tipo 1931 - 2025

Maria Tipo was an Italian pianist who made an international career after she won the 1949 Geneva International Music Competition and came in third at the Queen Elisabeth Competition. She revived the music of Muzio Clementi, and was known for playing and recording music by Scarlatti, Bach, Beethoven and Chopin. She also taught at conservatories around the world. Tipo died in Florence on 10 February 2025, at the age of 93.



#### Tony Kinsey 1927 - 2025

Cyril Anthony Kinsey was an English jazz drummer and composer. Kinsey led his own ensemble at the Flamingo Club in London through the 1950s, and recorded on more than 80 sessions between 1950 and 1977. He performed at European jazz festivals both as a drummer and as a poet, and did some work as a session musician in the 1950s and 1960s. Kinsey also branched into composition. Kinsey died on 10 February 2025, aged 97.



#### Jimi Mbaye 1957 - 2025

Mamadou "Jimi" Mbaye was a Senegalese guitarist best known for his work with Youssou N'dour and his Super Etoile band. Mbaye developed a unique Senegalese guitar style in which he made his Fender Stratocaster sound like local instruments such as the kora or xalam. Jimi Mbaye died on February 12, 2025, at the age of 67, following a long illness.



#### Tommy Hunt 1933 - 2025

Thomas James Hunt was an American soul/northern soul singer, and a 2001 Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Inductee as a member of famed R&B group the Flamingos. In 1959, the group's biggest hit record was "I Only Have Eyes for You". In 1997, Hunt relocated to the UK and embarked on a revived northern soul scene. Hunt died on February 12, 2025, at the age of 91.



#### Lynn August 1948 - 2025

Lynn August (born Joseph Leonard August Jr.) was an American zydeco accordionist, keyboard player, singer, and bandleader, blind from the age of four. August first performed solo in clubs and restaurants, and recorded his first single, "Little Red Rooster" in 1966, going on to release multiple solo and collaborative records. He toured Europe in 1994. He died on February 13, 2025 at age 76.



Elliot Ingber 1941 - 2025

Elliot Ingber was an American guitarist. Ingber had stints with Frank Zappa's Mothers of Invention (later fired from the band by Zappa following an incident onstage), his own cofounded and later reformed Fraternity of Man, and Captain Beefheart's Magic Band. Ingber died on January 21, 2025, at the age of 83.




#### A.D.O.R. 1969 - 2025

Eddy Castellanos Sr., known professionally as A.D.O.R., was an American hip hop artist whose work includes the Pete Rock-produced hit "Let It All Hang Out" (Atlantic, 1992), and "One for the Trouble" (Atlantic, 1994), produced by K-Def. The latter has been sampled extensively in later songs, most famously in "Renegade Master". A.D.O.R. died in September 2024, with his death not announced until January 2025.



#### Corey Crewe 1945 - 2025

Corey Crewe was a Canadian musician, best known as one half of the husband and wife musical group Corey and Trina. They performed throughout all regions of Newfoundland and Labrador and were extremely popular on the island pub scene. One of their best known songs is "The Northern Lights of Labrador". Trina died of cancer on 5 July 2007 in Calgary, Alberta, and Corey Crewe was reunited with Trina on February 8, 2025, at the age of 80.



#### Bobby Hamilton n.d. - 2025

Bobby Hamilton was an American singer, known as part of the soul vocal group The Choice Four. They had several minor hits on the Billboard charts in the mid-1970s, but their biggest hit, "Come Down to Earth" became a disco favourite only after the group had broken up. Bobby Hamilton died in February 2025.



#### Bruce Howe 1947 - 2025

Bruce Howe was an Australian musician. Bruce was best known for being the bassist in Fraternity, Mickey Finn, and Jimmy Barnes' band, and was referred to as 'The Dingo' by his bandmates. He later also co-founded Megaboys. Bruce Howe died on 29 January 2025, at the age of 77.



Edweena Banger 1947 - 2025

Edweena Banger, previously known

best known as lead singer for The Nosebleeds until her departure from the band following financial disputes. Garrity went on as Ed Banger, also releasing several records, collaborations, and rereleases of Nosebleeds material. She briefly fronted a glam fetish group, PleaSureDome, which became glam revival band Edwina's Rockschool, and also dabbled in lo-fi before the 2013 reformation of Ed Banger and The Nosebleeds. Edweena died in January 2025, prior to the release of her newest album.

#### Abdoulaye Diabaté 1959 - 2025

Diabaté studied at the National School of Arts of Senegal for 10 years. He developed a passion for jazz and became the leader of the Orchestre National du Sénégal. In 2002, he founded the Kora Jazz Trio alongside Djeli Moussa Diawara and Moussa Sissokho. In 2010, Diawara left the trio. Abdoulaye Diabaté died in Boulogne-Billancourt on 16 January 2025, at the age of 65.



#### Zulfiqar Ali Atray 1963 - 2025

Zulfiqar Ali Atray was a Pakistani singer. He composed songs for more than 50 films. He was awarded the Presidential Award in 2024. He died from a heart attack in Lahore, on 17 January 2025, at the age of 61.



#### Unk

#### 1981 - 2025

Anthony Leonard Platt, better known by his stage name Unk, was an American DJ, hype man, and rapper. He is best known for his 2006 snap hit "Walk It Out".On January 24, 2025, Platt's wife confirmed through social media that he had died at the age of 43. According to TMZ, his cause of death was a heart attack.



#### Gabriel Yacoub 1952 - 2025

Gabriel Yacoub was a French musician and visual artist. He was a lead member of the 1973 Celtic music band Malicorne, pioneering the revival of traditional music in contemporary formats. He later also played and recorded solo music. In July 2013, Yacoub was honoured as an officer of the Ordre des Arts et des Lettres. Yacoub died after a long illness at a hospital in Bourges on 22 January 2025, at the age of 72.

#### Anil Bharathi



1950 - 2025

Kalabushana Anil Bharathi was a Sri Lankan musician and singer. Often considered the "Christmas singer", Bharathi dominated in indoor concerts for more than five decades. On 8 January 2022, the road where he lived was named as Anil Bharati Place for his 50-year service to music. Bharathi died while receiving treatment at Panadura Hospital, on 22 January 2025, at the age of 75.



#### Peter Schmidl 1941 - 2025


Peter Schmidl was an Austrian clarinetist, and at one time the principal clarinetist of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra. He has played with the MDR Orchestra, the Salzburg Mozarteum Orchestra, and the Tokyo New Philharmonia. He taught at the University of Music and Performing Arts, Vienna since 1967. Schmidl died on 1 February 2025, at the age of 84.



# Emilia Contessa

#### 1957 - 2025

Nur Indah Cintra Sukma Munsyi, commonly known as Emilia Contessa, was an Indonesian pop singer and actress. She was a member of the Regional Representative Council, representing East Java, from 2014 to 2019. Contessa died on 27 January 2025, at the age of 67, surrounded by her husband, children, and other family members.



İlhan Usmanbaş was a Turkish contemporary classical composer. He was of the "second generation" of Turkish composers, who integrated European techniques into Turkish music. He served as director of first the Ankara State Conservatory and then the Istanbul State Conservatory, influencing generations of students. İlhan Usmanbaş died on 30 January 2025 at the age of 103.



# Mike Ratledge 1943 - 2025

Michael Ronald Ratledge was a British musician. A part of the Canterbury scene, he was a founding member of Soft Machine. He was the last founding member to leave the group, doing so in 1976. Ratledge married Marsha Hunt on 15 April 1967. On 5 February 2025, Ratledge died after a short illness. He was 81.



#### Marianne Faithfull 1946 - 2025

Marianne Evelyn Gabriel Faithfull was an English singer and actress who achieved popularity in the 1960s with the release of her UK top 10 single "As Tears Go By". She became one of the leading female artists of the British Invasion in the United States. In 2023, Rolling Stone ranked Faithfull at number 173 on its list of the 200 Greatest Singers of All Time. Faithfull died on 30 January 2025, aged 78.



#### Denis Wick 1931 - 2025

Denis Wick was an influential British orchestral trombonist. He was also an internationally respected brass teacher and designer of brass mutes and mouthpieces. On retirement in 1989 he was awarded the International Trombone Association's annual award; he served as their president 2004–2006. His death was announced on 12 February 2025.



#### Olga James 1929 - 2025

Olga James was an American singer and actress best known for her role in the film Carmen Jones (1954). Her later acting credits include a role in the Broadway musical Mr. Wonderful and a recurring role on The Bill Cosby Show. James died in Los Angeles on January 25, 2025, at the age of 95 from complications from a fall.



# Sukri Bommagowda 1937 - 2025

Sukri Bommagowda was a folk sing-

er belonging to the Halakki Vokkaliga tribe in Ankola, Karnataka, India. She received several including awards, the Padma Shri, one of India's highest civilian honours, for her contributions to the arts, and her work in preserving traditional tribal music. Bommagowda died on 13 February 2025 at a hospital in Manipal, Karnataka where she had been undergoing treatment, reportedly at the age of 88.



Naâman

1990 - 2025

Martin Mussard, better known by his stage name Naâman, was a French reggae musician, singer, and songwriter, with ska, blues, folk, hip hop, and dancehall influences. With his friends, he organized a charity concert in May 2015 in Paris in aid of earthquake victims in Nepal. He was also active in aid of Caritas for helping Migrant Domestic Workers in Lebanon. Naâman died from complications of cancer on 7 February 2025, at the age of 34.




#### Pratul Mukhopadhyay 1942 - 2025

Pratul Mukhopadhyay was an Indian Bengali-language singer, creative artist and songwriter. He is the writer and the singer of the famous Bengali song Ami Banglay Gan Gai and Dinga Bhashao Sagore. He was a playback singer in the Bengali film Gosaibaganer Bhoot. He passed away on 15 February 2025 in Kolkata, India, due to pancreatic ailments and other age-related health issues.



Jane McGarrigle 1941 - 2025 Laury Jane McGarrigle was a Canadian musician and music publisher, known mainly for her work with her younger sisters, singers Kate & Anna McGarrigle. She was the co-author of a book about the three sisters' childhood and musical experiences. She died on January 24, 2025, at the age of 83.



#### Chad Morgan 1933 - 2025

Chadwick William Morgan was an Australian country music singer and guitarist known for his vaudeville style of comic country and western and folk songs, his prominent teeth and goofy stage persona. In reference to his first recording, he was known as "The Sheik of Scrubby Creek". Morgan died on 1 January 2025, at the age of 91.



Ana María Iriarte 1927 - 2025

Ana María Iriarte was a Spanish operatic mezzo-soprano and voice teacher. Trained in Madrid, Vienna, Milan and Paris, she appeared internationally in opera and especially zarzuela, but retired from the stage at age 32. She founded a school in Barcelona where she taught voice, and in 2006 created a foundation that runs an international zarzuela competition to this day. Iriarte died on 4 February 2025, at the age of 98.





#### Barry Goldberg 1941 - 2025

Barry Joseph Goldberg was an American blues and rock keyboardist, songwriter, and record producer. Goldberg co-produced albums by Percy Sledge, Charlie Musselwhite, James Cotton, and the Textones, plus Bob Dylan's version of Curtis Mayfield's "People Get Ready". Barry Goldberg died in Los Angeles, California due to complications from non-Hodgkin's lymphoma on January 22, 2025, at the age of 83.



#### John Sykes 1959 - 2025


John James Sykes was an English guitarist, best known as a member of

Whitesnake, Thin Lizzy and Tygers of Pan Tang. He also fronted the hard rock group Blue Murder and released several solo albums.On 20 January 2025, it was announced that Sykes had died from cancer in December 2024, at the age of 65.



#### Govind Sharan Lohra 1955 - 2025

Govind Sharan Lohra was an Indian folk artist. He was a Nagpuri folk singer, songwriter and dancer, and performed in many national events, leading to his receipt of several awards including Akruti Samman, Peter Naurangi Sahitya Samman and Jharkhand Bibhuti. His folk music had also aided researchers in the regional language Department of Ran-



#### Petr Hannig 1946 - 2025

Petr Hannig was a Czech singer, producer, politician and leader of the Party of Common Sense.

In July 2017, he announced his candidacy for the president of the Czech Republic in the 2018 election. He died in Prague on 21 January 2025, one day after his 79th birthday.




#### Mike Miller 1953 - 2025

Mike Miller was an American rock and jazz guitarist. He worked with Chick Corea, Bette Midler, Yellowjackets, Brand X, Burton Cummings, Vinnie Colaiuta, Quincy Jones, Gino Vannelli, and Vital Information. He also played bass in the Sioux Falls Symphony. Miller died of a heart attack on January 18, 2025, at the age of 71.



Wily Mignon 1986 - 2025

Mignon E. Wilfried, better known by the stage name Wily Mignon, was a Beninese singer, composer, and arranger. Mignon began his musical work with his sisters in Ouidah, where he was a school orchestra conductor. While living in Porto-Novo, he was a bassist and launched an album in June 2007. He then entered into a relationship with the singer Dossi, but the couple separated in 2021. Wily Mignon died in Ouagadougou on 4 February 2025, at the age of 38.



# Naing Myanmar နိုင်မြန်မာ 1956 - 2025

Naing Myanmar was a Burmese musician notable for writing "Kabar Ma Kyay Buu", a protest song used during Myanmar's 8888 Uprising and again throughout the 2021 Myanmar coup d'état. His music has remained influential to Burmese artists and activists. Naing Myanmar's work, especially "Kabar Ma Kyay Buu", has remained a powerful symbol of resistance and democracy in Myanmar. On 7 February 2025, Myanmar died from a heart attack at his home.

#### Félix Cumbé 1964 - 2025

Félix Cumbé was a Haitian singer and songwriter of merengue and bachata. His musical debut took place in the 1980s with his single El Gatico. His popularity increased with the songs Feliz Cumbé and Déjame Volver, which he sang along with Fernando Villalona. In 2012 he returned to show business with Tu no ta pa mi.. He died on 11 February 2025.



#### Prabhakar Karekar 1944- 2025

Pandit Prabhakar Karekar was a Hindustani classical vocalist, born in Goa, Portuguese India. He was awarded Tansen Samman in 2014 and Sangeet Natak Akademi Award in the year 2016. Karekar was also the founder Chairman of and the Swarprabha Trust. He has many recordings to his credit and has performed, lectured and held workshops or taken part in conferences in many countries. Karekar died on 12 February 2025, aged 80.



#### Wayne Osmond 1951 - 2025

Melvin Wayne Osmond was an American musician. He was the second-oldest of the original Osmond Brothers singers and the fourth oldest of the nine Osmond siblings. In 1997, he was diagnosed with a brain tumor, which was successfully treated, but the treatment left Osmond nearly deaf and reliant on a cochlear implant. He continued to tour and perform until a stroke in 2012 left him unable to play guitar. Osmond suffered another stroke and died in Salt Lake City, Utah, on January 1, 2025, at the age of 73.

Anniversary European Tour, Yesspeak offers a 169-minute documentary about the classic progressive rock band Yes. The feature, narrated by Roger Daltrey, has a near three-hour running time allowing rather more depth than the usual rockumentary. Divided into 10 chapters the programme systematically covers the background, history and outlook of the group before an extended interview with each of the five members of the classic line-up: Jon Anderson (vocals), Steve Howe (guitar), Chris Squire (bass), Alan White (drums), and Rick Wakeman (keys).

Archive material and glimpses of the 2003 tour are interwoven with the interviews, this is very much a documentary, not a concert On the DVD: Yesspeak comes as a two-disc set. Disc 1 offers the first five chapters and 89 minutes of the documentary, while the remaining 80 minutes are featured on Disc 2. The picture is an excellent amamorphically enhanced 16:9 widescreen presentation, though by necessity the archive material is of variable quality. There are excellent Dolby Digital 5.1 and DTS soundtracks. Disc 2 also showcases 126 minutes of concert audio. This is accompanied by concert photos but the sound is only Dolby Digital 5.1, without a DTS option.


# All About Eve 'Live in Bonn' 1991 SIGNED DVD



With the departure of guitarist Steve Hackett in 1977, Genesis were reduced to a trio. Yet with their ninth studio album, ... And Then There Were Three..., Phil Collins, Tony Banks and Mike Rutherford continued to expand the scope of what the group could achieve. Released as the album's lead single, the classic Follow You Follow Me proved that Genesis could be chart hitmakers, while their performance at Knebworth on 26 June 1978 – headlining the day-long A Midsummer Night's Dream festival, on a bill with Tom Petty And The Heartbreakers, Jefferson Starship and Devo – continued their ascent to arena-filling mega-stardom.

Pink Floyd's 10th studio album "Animals" was released almost 10 years on from their psychedelic debut that launched the band on to the world stage. But this release couldn't be farther from "The Piper At The Gates Of Dawn" if you tried: It was a hard-hitting politically charged heavy rock album. Its three central pieces, "Pigs (Three Different Ones)", "Dogs" and "Sheep" each extending to over 10 minutes each drew parallels with George Orwell's dystopian nightmare "Animal Farm". Its lyrics continued to project Roger Waters' eternal themes of life's struggles where the subservient masses are sheep controlled by tyrannical pigs and authoritarian dogs.

Recorded over the summer of 1976, in the space of time it took punk to both explode and promptly fizzle out, at their own Britannia Row studios in north London, it also marked a shift





from their traditional base of EMI at Abbey Road. Arguably one of Pink Floyd's least well recorded works it does however hold a fond place in many fans hearts and Animals has enjoyed a legacy – Roger Waters in particular reviving those tracks to shoehorn into his own politically charged live solo shows in recent years.

The corresponding tour through the first half of 1977 was also not without compromise and built on the stadium spectacular that had been successfully developed over the previous two years of touring. Creatively, there was no limit to their ambition as large-scale inflatable structures, screen films, special effects and state of the art sound reinforcement were utilized that enveloped the audience in an ever-increasing immersive experience. But, despite all this, as their fan base increased exponentially so too did the rowdy nature of the stadium environment which, coupled with band members personal issues, ultimately led to inter-band rifts and Roger Waters' increasing intolerance of and disdain towards the adulation of the fans.

This all finally came to a spectacular head during their final show of the "Animals" tour in Montreal in July and the events that unfolded became the lynchpin of Waters' vision of isolation and madness that eventually led to the creation of "The Wall" two years later.

"Pink Floyd – The Animals Tour – A Visual History" By Glenn Povey documents both the history of the recording of the album and the supporting tours which remains one of the most fascinating periods in Pink Floyd's history.






## • THE DODO'S DREAM

"We just knew that we were on to something special with these Narrowboat Sessions the moment that this young lady started to sing. The charming Molly Tilston is of course the daughter of the superb Steve Tilston and the late great and sorely missed Maggie Boyle, and the evidence that genetics really do come into it is in this beautifully simple song she wrote called 'Dragonfly'."

During the evening, Molly performed alongside what she calls "...the wonderful musicians, my beautiful friends, Vernon Bigsby, Lotte Har, Rick Burrows, Chris Manley and Brian Toberman."

They also performed some of their own songs and a mix of swing and Gypsy jazz.

Indeed, the stage area was filled with musicians and talent... and it was a lively, bustling, Saturday night audience. Molly bared her soul - lots of personal songs about home, homelessness, challenges and new ways of living. Vernon and Lotte kept the evening swinging with Hot Club vibes, and Chris and others performed some of their own songs and accompanied Molly... and jammed on into the night...

Alan: Thanks for taking time to have a chat, Molly. The gig with you and your friends at the 3 Wise Monkeys was really busy and





successful. Congrats. I know a little bit about your musical family, partly from Mark Holdsworth, who coordinates the Narrowboat Sessions, which raises money for cancer research and which are partly dedicated to the memory of your mother, musician and singer, Maggie Boyle. Tell me a bit about your musical family and growing up. It sounds quite complicated!

**Molly:** Complicated, beautiful, organised chaos! My happiest childhood memories are the times on

the road with my parents and older brother. I utterly adored watching my parents on stage and I was and still am endlessly proud of their music and abilities to connect with people. For me, it was easy and exciting on the road, but integrating children with with more conventional lives was very difficult, and I struggled with education settings. There were often times when my parents left for long periods of time to tour, and I know they found this very difficult. It was not in any way a 'normal' childhood,







I was drenched in music and surrounded by colourful and talented people and today I realise how lucky I was. I often think of the times spent in the back of an old banger, next to my brother, listening to Dad's music, driving up a motorway to another venue. These were happy times.

Alan: I have put together quite a few links to your songs and a range of performances and will add them into an article together with this 'conversation'. When did you start recording music, and are there many recordings with your family members including your sister, Martha, and brother, Joe?

**Molly:** I always sang, I knew every word to every song my parents performed probably by the age of 5, yet I still claimed that I would never be a folk singer. I started to drop out of school around the age of 13, I was definitely being pulled towards music. By the age of 16 I had a bunch of songs, and I started to perform, and I recorded in my bedroom. Unfortunately, there is not much out there of us together, Joe has recorded a song of mine, I am on some of Martha's albums, and we have recorded bits together, but for our own enjoyment and not to be released.

Alan: You must have been pretty shell-shocked with your mum's cancer diagnosis. I think you wrote 'I am a Woman Now' to prove to her that you were resilient.

**Molly:** We were all utterly devastated, my brother and I were utterly heartbroken for a very long time, such is life. Mum was the glue that held us together, the life and soul of our existence, and we had a huge fight on our hands trying to keep her with us. Mum worried about me a lot. I'd had my struggles



and at the time of her passing, I had a young daughter. It brought her comfort when I reassured her that I was going to be desense to tell her in a

OK, it made sense to tell her in a song.

Alan: At the time of her passing in 2014, you were playing with, and I think recording an album with Lee Southall from The Coral. Has that album been finished and released? Any other releases apart from songs recorded for the Narrowboat Sessions?

**Molly:** Lee and I had the opportunity to record our debut album at Peter Gabriel's Realworld Studios. We spent 2 weeks recording on reel-toreel, we worked with some top musicians. The album is incredible, and my best work to date, we were with our writing prolific and musically worked very well together. Unfortunately, I was going through some very tricky circumstances in my personal life, I think losing mum triggered a breakdown. Myself and Lee separated and the album was never released. I still to this day push for its release.

Alan: At the recent gig you shared a lot of your own challenges and issues with the audience. You put a lot of emphasis on 'home', 'homelessness', 'where you will sleep' and 'put your head tonight'. And you said that you were finding 'new ways of living'. How's that all going?

**Molly:** Music is therapy to me, I like to be brutally honest with in my songs, I have to write about my traumatic experiences to heal. It is much harder to write happy songs, you know!? I like to talk about my struggles. my struggles with alcoholism, relationships and beyond, as I find most people have had similar experiences and it's a good way to connect with my audience. My children and I became homeless last year, through a 'No fault Eviction', we ended up in temporary accommodation, this was a life-changing experience and one I am grateful to be at the other side of.

Alan: At times you remind me a bit of Melanie, who I saw first at the Isle of Wight Festival. There is a shared feeling about facing darkness and finding redemption. She was also keen to shed the label of 'folkie' – which you make something of an issue.

**Molly:** I just never wanted to be pigeon-holed into the folk scene. I am inspired by so much more than just folk music, although I am very proud of my folk heritage.

Alan: I came away from the gig with a positive vibe, about your performance, and your new songs. You also seem very energised by your daughter...are your plans working out?

**Molly:** That makes me very happy! I am very happy with how things are going at the minute - I have a wonderful band, and we are looking forward to more gigs and recording the new material over the next few months.

### LUNAR MISTAKE LUNAR MISTAKE INDEPENDENT

Somehow I came across the band Lunar Mistake and when I asked them for more information I was sent this, "Lunar Mistake is a prog/post-punk/ new wave band from Oakland. It features long-time members of the Bay Area music scene, including Matt Lebofsky (Secret Chiefs 3. miRthkon, MoeTar) on keyboards, Steve Lew (New Zombies, Eskimo, Ebola Soup) on bass, David Shamrock (Sleepytime Gorilla Museum, Free Salamander Exhibit, Slombis) on drums, Drew Wheeler (Free Salamander Exhibit, Young Has Beens) on guitar, and Jackie Wheeler on vocals and percussion. Points of reference may include: Devo, Thinking Plague, Danny Elfman, Rush." The more observant of you may have seen a couple of musical genres listed which surely could only mean one thing, and you would be right, as here is a pronk band which Tim Smith would surely be proud of. I cannot believe I don't see a mention of Cardiacs in their influences (is it really more than a quarter of a century since 'Sing To God'?) as here is a band who have taken pronk and run with it to make something which is RIO, Avant, yet somehow commercial at the same time.

Jackie may not have a great deal of experience in bands but she is happy with everything the band is throwing at her, whether it is the Devo-style punk of "Infinite Loop" or the more comical "Fishies". This is a load of fun which could have come from the stable of either Cardiacs or Poisoned Electrick head and is a blast of punk prog fun which is so very different indeed to what is in the current scene where prog often seems to be quite involved at gazing at one's navel. What we have here is a band producing music which was underground thirty years, and now is even more so as they are so very different indeed, yet their jagged angular melodies and guitar riffs are literally music to my ears.




### MANIC ABRAXAS SKINFORMATION INDEPENDENT

I knew absolutely nothing about this band when I agreed to review them,

just that I thought that artwork was cool and interesting so why not? From the wooded realms of Northern Maine, Manic Abraxas comprise drummer Tom Bennett, bassist/vocalist/synth player Justin Hamm, and guitarist/ vocalist/synth player Dallas Seger and theyr formed the band back in 2012. This is their fourth album, and demonstrates their love of the darker sides of and metal as they take inspiration from the likes of Celtic Frost, early High On Fire, and Unearthly Trance. This is raw underground metal which brings together the likes of doom and black metal with stoner and punk which is all then thrown together with a solid dose of NWOBHM.


It is raw, unadulterated, and will be appreciated by those who prefer their music to be crusty and in your face with aggression and attitude at least as important as melody and performance. I can imagine their gigs are sweaty and insane with numerous walls of death and pits, and in that environment their music will be quite good fun, but whether one wants to sit and listen to this 8-track 37-minute-long album is something else altogether. For me there is too much punk attitude and bite, and not enough in terms of songs and melody for em to stay consistently interested but undoubtedly there is a market out there and if this is your thing then it is available on Bandcamp.



#### MATT PANAYIDES TRIO WITH EYES CLOSED PACIFIC COAST JAZZ

On this album guitarist Matt Panayides is joined by bassist Steve LaSpina and drummer Anthony Pinciotti, and they take on eight songs by six jazz composers (including two apiece by Cedar Walton and Wayne Shorter) plus reinvented versions of three standards. There is close interplay between the three musicians and while Panayides is very much the leader he also gives plenty of solo space to both LaSpina and Pinciotti so all three musicians have plenty of room to shine. The result is post-bop jazz which is inventive and interesting as everyone works around the melodies but brings them to nice conclusions. Panayides has a very fluid style, so much so that his playing is often more like liquid than individual notes, yet the other two are always right there with him to provide the correct support.

There are many styles taken onboard as the trio work through the likes of Frank Foster's jazz waltz "Simone," there is a powerful take on Chick Corea's "Straight Up And Down," Cedar Walton's "Hindsight," a tasteful yet passionate revival of Wayne Shorter's "Nefertiti," and Joe Henderson's "Serenity." Cedar Walton's "Mode For Joe" swings hard, as does Shorter's "Ju Ju" and Woody Shaw's "Moon Trane." "I Fall In Love Too Easily" is given an imaginative reharmonization, "Moon River" is reinvented as an introspective unaccompanied guitar showcase where Panayides takes a long time to get to the main melody, so much so that one may well not recognise it when it commences, and it is only as time progresses that it becomes more apparent. If you enjoy jazz lead guitar then this is worth investigating further.



### MOTHER MALLARD MAKE WAY CUNEIFORM RECORDS

The full name of the band is Mother Mallard's Portable Masterpiece Co. / David Borden while the album is 'Make Way For Mother Mallard: 50 Years Of Music', and as one may surmise from the title is a celebration of a band's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. American composer and musician David Borden helped pave the way for electronic music – via both analogue synthesizers and digital instruments – by forming the world's first ever synthesizer ensemble in Bob Moog's Trumansburg studio, using Moog's prototypes and finding a way of enabling them to be used in performance.

He then later founded and headed Cornell University's Digital Music Department. This 2- disc set features one disc of early (1970's) and one disc of recent (2019) Mother Mallard performances of several key Borden pieces.

The first two songs on this set, "Endocrine Dot Patterns" (15:30) and "C-A-G-E I" (32:10) feature the earliest full line-up of the band, with David Borden and Steve Drews being joined by Linda Fisher following the duo's early concerts when they realised they were limited at just how much they could play due to a lack of hands.

They had commenced by performing works by the likes of Robert Ashley, Morton Feldman, Daniel Lentz, Jon Hassell, Terry Riley, John Cage, Philip Glass and Steve Reich, but as time progressed their own compositions took precedent and for me the one which really stands out for me on this release is "C-A-G-E I" which is incredibly hypnotic and following a similar path to what would be experienced with Tangerine Dream who had much more musical success.

The repeated melodies and changing layers make for a complex arrangement which is quite dangerous to play when listening to in the car as it really does take hold of one's consciousness as all that exists are the notes. and the music is allencompassing. This is the first time I have come across Mother Mallard's Portable Masterpiece Co. who appear to be one of those bands whose influence has been much larger than their recorded output, with their debut only coming out in 1973, yet there is no doubt that Borden's work with Robert Moog had a huge impact on the world of synthesizers.



PIAH MAER UNDER THE SHADOW OF A FOREIGN SUN CODE666

Formed in 2010 by guitarists Luiz Felipe Netto and Igor Meira, the

group sought to conjure introspective yet the grandiose nature which can be found in the work of artists like Ihsahn. Opeth and Enslaved and there is no doubt that on their third album they are still working very much in that vein. After a brief stint as a trio in 2018 when they brought in a full-time drummer with whom they recorded their last album, they have gone back to being a duo with Netto providing vocals, guitars, keyboards and Meira guitars, bringing in a host of other musicians to assist them in fulfilling their vision.

A special callout should go to Tony Lindgren (Leprous, Amorphis, Enslaved) as he mastered this and turned fully understood the brief.


As with their major influences, one is never sure quite where Piah Mater are going to go as some of the music is very dark and Black Metal in its approach, while others are far lighter (and indeed closing number "Canicula" commences as Brazilian folk music, sung in Portuguese), which is certainly very different indeed to the likes of "Follow Garden" which is quite Ihsahn in its attack.

They can be incredibly brutal, with harshness and atmosphere, yet there is always a polish and shining light somewhere within the darkness which ensures the drama is always close at hand.

The switch between gruff and sung vocals is especially powerful and poignant as they also bring in keyboards to provide depth as they move more into Fleshgod Apocalypse territory. Then in the middle of the album we have a nice interlude with "Macaw's Lament", a nice fingerpicking exercise which certainly does not normally belong on an album which contains such ferocity but here it is very poignant indeed.


There is a great deal of depth on this release, with one never knowing quite where it is going to lead the listener, but the joy is in the journey. Well worth discovering.




Hawkwind Earth Visitors Passport -The "Hawkwind Passport"



He has been nominated for various awards, including the Governor Generals Award For Illustration.
