Dear Friends,

Welcome to the another issue of this singular little periodical of which I have the honour to be the editor. I hope that doesn't sound too flowery and over the top pretentious, but I truly do feel honoured to be the ringmaster if this particular little circus, even though it feels a bit at times that we are the parish magazine for a specific global village where a certain sector of the village elders are in the process of dying off at a rate of knots.

This week I have a spectacularly unlikely piece of

news for you. And, in many ways, it is more unlikely than half of the news stories about fafrotskies, synchronicities or lexilinks with which I am happy to fill our weekly Strange Days page.

Wait for it.

Yup, Scott Walker has released two albums in a row that one can actually *listen* to. And what's more, they both actually have tunes.

I have always been open about the fact that my favourite male singer is Scott Walker. For the record, my favourite female singer is Marianne Faithfull, but that is completely irrelevant to the main crux of this editorial. Yup, Scott Walker (whose real name is Noel Scott Engel) is a remarkable artist, and I believe that I own pretty well everything that he has ever done, although I do not often listen to some of his output. My favourites are his first four (imaginatively entitled *Scott, Scott II, Scott III,* and *Scott IV*) although all the other albums he recorded up to and including *Tilt* in 1995 have a lot to recommend them. I even like his two country albums from the mid-1970s and the first two *Walker Brothers* reunion albums from the second part of that decade.

It was the final record by *The Walker Brothers* (who were, by the way, not brothers, and none of them were surnamed Walker) that showed the direction that lay ahead. Divided into three, the Scott tracks are awesome, the John tracks are forgettable, and the Gary tracks are embarrassing. But it is one of

the Scott tracks - *The Electrician* - which totally defines where Scott was heading, and is not only the culmination of his career before or since, but is also my favourite record ever. It has been described as being about CIA trained torture technicians in Central America, or as being an erotic dialogue between a torturer and his or her victim, and a symphonic ode to S&M. It could be any or none of those.

After the 1978 album Nite Flights, which contained

the track, came and went, making narry a dent on the commercial marketplace, Scott's output became sparser and stranger. His mid-1980s album is probably the most peculiar album that whatshisface from *Dire Straits* ever recorded, and probably cured him of ever wanting his MTV again, and then there was a ten year wait for *Tilt*, a magnificently avant garde orchestral album, which I adore when I am in the right mood, and which I use to annoy people when they aren't.



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The next two albums - The Drift and Bish Bosch were magnificently unlistenable, but in 2007 came And Who Shall Go to the Ball? And What Shall Go to the Ball? the second release for him on 4AD. The album was originally commissioned as a contemporary dance piece for disabled and nondisabled dance company CandoCo, choreographed by Rafael Bonachela. A video with excerpts from the performance can be found at the CandoCo website. In a press release from his record label, Walker describes the music in the following way: "Apart from a slow movement given over to solitude, the music is full of edgy and staccato shapes or cuts, reflecting how we cut up the world around us as a consequence of the shape of our bodies. How much of a body does an intelligence need to be potentially socialised in an age of everdeveloping AI ? This is but one of many questions that informed the approach to the project."

The album was issued in just 2500 copies and will, according to the label, never be re-pressed. I have a copy and I even listen to it occasionally. Two years later came something that we Walkerpeople thought that we would never hear again; Scott Walker actually *singing* a song with a recognisable lyric and tune. But it wasn't one of his songs. He was guesting on the second album by the delectable *Bat for Lashes*, and the song only lasted a few minutes, before Scott disappeared into the twilight of the avant garde once more. I won't even try to describe his contribution to the Margate Exodus, which was a retelling if the Biblical book set in the south coast resort. But again I bought it, more out of loyalty

than anything else.

Then two years ago came *Soused*, a collaborative album between Scott and experimental metal band *Sunn O*))). Announced in early 2014 by 4AD, the album was produced by Walker and Peter Walsh with the help of Mark Warman and released on 21 October 2014. *The Guardian* described it as "surprisingly melodic" and it was generally described as being the most accessible album he had made since *Tilt* if not longer. *The Quietus* described it thus: "Soused moves from the monumental to the intimate: a retrograde zoom from the apocalyptic desert, the broad river, to the room, the body, the mind. In doing so it's a compelling and highly listenable work."

And now he has done it again. His new record isn't a proper album, of course, but a soundtrack.

Childhood of a Leader is a 2015 historical mystery drama film, written, produced and directed by Brady Corbet, and is Corbet's feature film directorial debut. It is loosely based on Jean-Paul Sartre's short story "The Childhood of a Leader", published in 1939 in a collection entitled *The Wall*, and John Fowles's 1965 novel *The Magus*. Corbet co-wrote the screenplay with his wife Mona Fastvold, and filmed both an English and a French language version. The film chronicles the childhood of a fascist leader in the period immediately following World War I.

Walker's score received positive response, as Gary Goldstein of *LA Times* said that it "impresses and fascinates", Donald Clarke of *Irish Times* called it "MVP" of the film, while Peter Bradshaw of *The Guardian* described it as an "almost Herrmannesque orchestral score from Scott Walker. The touch of suppressed psychopathic rage comes from his music."

But everyone, except for your own humble scribe, seems to have missed the point. Walker's score actually has tunes, and arrangements, to die for. And I am sure I am not the only Walkerfan who is clutching at those straws and hoping against hope, that this means that - although he is now in his midseventies - that he could come out with one last record that might touch the heartstrings in the way as did his first two brace of albums. And let's face it, weirder things have happened.

Seeing the amount of emotion Mr. Palmer could trigger in everyone truly made me realize how much love I have for him. Today's athletes are a product of his life and career, and the sports (as well as the real) world will never have another like him

Any attempts to repeal the Hunting Act would be "deeply unpopular" among the majority of the British public, a new poll has found. The Ipsos MORI poll commissioned by animal welfare charity the League Against Cruel Sports found 84% of the public do not want a return to fox hunting.

Opposition to hare hunting and deer hunting was even stronger, at 91% and 88% respectively.

The poll also suggested banning fox hunting is growing increasingly popular among Conservative voters. It is now at 73%, having risen from 64% in 2013, 66% in 2014, and 70% in 2015. League Against Cruel Sports chief executive, Eduardo Goncalves, said: "Today's polling highlights just how out of touch any move to repeal the hunting ban would be with the views held by the majority of the British public - including Conservative voters.

"The overwhelming view of electorates is that they do not want their parliamentary representatives supporting repeal."

Mr Goncalves also attacked Environment Secretary Andrea Leadsom, who has suggested she would take a fresh look at fox hunting. He said: "The Hunting Act made hunting wild animals with dogs for sport illegal, protecting a number of animals including foxes, hare, and deer. Not only would a move to legalise the cruel sport be potentially detrimental to the animals the law protects, but as today's polling makes clear - would make no sense politically. It is time for Andrea Leadsom to join the rest of the country and support the hunting ban."

Stephen John Byrd (1955 – 2016)

Byrd was a British guitarist and session musician who worked with artists including Kim Wilde, Ian Gillan, ZZebra and many others.

Initially a self-taught guitarist, Byrd joined the band Zzebra for their second album *Panic*, after his old friend Tommy Eyre had recommended him for the job. With the band he played the Reading Festival in 1975 and recorded another album, *Take It Or Leave It*.

In 1978 he replaced Paul Simon in Ian North's band Neo, a new wave band formed in 1977. Neo recorded an album in Ian Gillan's studio, and after Gillan had heard them he hired Byrd and bassist John McCoy for his own band, which was also called Gillan, and which recorded their first *Gillan* in September 1978. This was not released in the UK but sold well as an import.

In 1982 Byrd auditioned for pop singer Kim Wilde and became a long-term member of Kim's backing band. With Kim, he co-wrote "Another Step", "Hey Mister Heartache" and many others, and also played on some of her albums. He toured with Kim Wilde until the mid-1990s.

In the 1990s he was also a member of "4 Bills And A Ben", a band with flexible line-up formed by Johnny Warman which also included Jeff Rich and John Edwards from Status Quo.

In 2001 he played in The Mods at the Steve Marriott tribute in 2001.

Other acts Byrd toured with were The Buggles, Martha and the Muffins, Billy Ocean, Ruby Turner,

Samantha Fox, A Flock of Seagulls, The Pet Shop Boys, Erasure, Bonnie Tyler, Alec Mansion, Shakin' Stevens, Heartbeat UK and Kim Appleby.

He died of a heart attack in Munich on 2nd October 2016, aged 61.



Michael Casswell (1963 – 2016)

Casswell was an English session guitarist who toured and recorded with numerous artists including Brian May, Joe Bonamassa, Steve Hackett, and Cozy Powell.

Casswell started playing the guitar from the age of 11. In the mid-1980s he was signed to RCA USA as a part of a band called Heroes, and from the late 1980s to the early 1990s he was signed to MCA UK with the British rock band Walk on Fire, which released an album *Blind Faith* in 1989.

In 1992, he joined the Brian May Band for the South America tour. Casswell co-wrote and co-produced Cozy Powell's last solo album *Especially for You* that was released in 1998. From 2006 to 2008, Casswell played in the West End Queen musical, *We Will Rock You*.

Casswell has also taught guitar through many DVDs from Lick Library with an emphatic focus on classic rock and blues styles. Since 2011, he has been regularly contributing to Guitar Interactive magazine with columns, gear reviews and interviews. He released a solo album in 2014.

Casswell was a keen user of the guitar's tremolo bar, and also frequently played a Music Man (Luke) guitar, as well as various Fender Stratocasters and James Tyler guitars.

He died in a swimming accident in Spain, on 30th September aged 53.



Royal Torrence "Little Royal" (1935? - 2016)

Singer and bandleader Royal Torrence, aka "Little Royal," was half brother of James Brown; they shared the same father.

Torrence had a following in soul music circles in the 1960s and 70s, and is often credited with discovering Teddy Pendergrass, who was a waiter at Edgehill's Club in Atlantic City when Torrence held auditions for his band, The Swingmasters. Pendergrass won over the job as drummer, which gave him his first break touring. His work with the Swingmasters led to a future opportunity with Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes, and his entry into stardom

Little Royal made waves in the 1970s with the hit "Jealousy," and recorded for over a decade with several labels, including Carnival and Tri-Us, landing a number of regional hits. His band also backed many of the biggest stars of the world when they toured through his adopted home of Washington, DC.

Though he was never a huge charting star, Little Royal maintained a following, particularly in Europe and in the DC area, right up through the time of his death.

Little Royal died at the age of 81 on September 29, 2016.



Rodney Lynn "Rod" Temperton (1947 – 2016)

Temperton was an English songwriter, record producer, and musician who initially made his mark as the keyboardist and main songwriter for the R&B band Heatwave before writing several internationally known songs performed by Michael Jackson, including mega-hit Thriller as well as Off The Wall, Rock With You," and numerous others.

Temperton attended De Aston School in Market Rasen and formed a group for the school's music competitions. He was a drummer at this time, but he

soon became a full-time musician, a keyboard player, and played in several dance bands.

He went to Worms in Germany, and in 1972 Temperton and guitarist Bernd Springer formed a soul cover band called Sundown Carousel. With Temperton on an old Hammond organ the band performed in clubs and GI bars in cities such as Mannheim.

In 1974 he answered an advert in *Melody Maker* placed by Johnnie Wilder, Jr. and became a member of the popular funk/disco band, Heatwave.

Temperton played tunes he had been composing to Johnny Wilder, Jr., and the songs provided material for 1976's *Too Hot to Handle* including "Boogie Nights", which broke the band in Britain and the United States, and the ballad, "Always and Forever". In 1978 Temperton decided to concentrate on writing and left Heatwave, though he continued to write for the band.

Temperton's work attracted the attention of Quincy Jones and in 1979, he was recruited by Jones to write for what became Michael Jackson's first solo album in four years, and his first full-fledged solo release for Epic Records, entitled *Off the Wall*. Temperton wrote three songs for the album, including "Rock with You" which became the second US No. 1 single from the album.

In the early 1980s Temperton left Germany and moved to Beverly Hills, California. In 1982 he wrote three songs, including the title track, for Jackson's next LP, *Thriller*, which became the biggest-selling album of all time.

In 1986 Temperton was nominated for the Best Original Song Oscar for "Miss Celie's Blues," which he cowrote with Quincy Jones and Lionel Richie for *The Color Purple*.

He died in September/October of cancer, aged 66.



Joan Marie Johnson Faust (1944? - 2016)

Johnson was one of the founding members of The Dixie Cups, the New Orleans 1960s singing group who reached the top of the national charts in the 1964 with "Chapel of Love", a song that Phil Spector, Jeff Barry and Ellie Greenwich had originally written for The Ronettes, and which famously knocked The Beatles out of the top spot on the recording charts.

The trio consisted of sisters Barbara Ann and Rosa Lee Hawkins; plus their cousin Joan Marie Johnson, from New Orleans. They first sang together in grade school. Originally they were to be called Little Miss and the Muffets, but were named the Dixie Cups just prior to their first release.

In 1963 the trio decided to pursue a professional

career in music and began singing locally as the Meltones.

"Iko Iko", a New Orleans traditional song, was recorded in 1964 but later was released as a single early in 1965. Barbara Hawkins had heard her grandmother sing the song, first recorded in 1953 as "Jock-a-Mo" by James "Sugar Boy" Crawford. Barbara Hawkins: "We were just clowning around with it during a session using drumsticks on ashtrays. We didn't realize that Jerry and Mike had the tapes running". Leiber and Stoller overdubbed a bassline and percussion, and released it. It was The Dixie Cups' fifth and last hit.

Johnson became a Jehovah's Witness and left her music career, and died in New Orleans on 5th October of congestive heart failure at the age of 72.



Caroline Crawley (? - 2016)

Crawley was one half of the '80s UK duo Shelleyan Orphan. Crawley and Tayle formed the band in Bournemouth in the early '80s, and developed a baroque, string-laden form of alternative pop, one that took Kate Bush's romanticism to more gothy places. They released their early singles "Cavalry Of Cloud" and "Anatomy Of Love" on Rough Trade in 1986, and their debut album *Helleborine* in 1987.

They'd also open for the Cure on tour, and Crawley would sing on a few songs from This Mortal Coil's 1991 album *Blood*. The duo broke up in 1992, when Crawley formed a new band called Babacar, which

Tayle would later join. Shelleyan Orphan reunited in 2000 to contribute a song to a Tim Buckley tribute compilation, and they released one more album, *We Have Everything We Need*, in 2000.

Crawley died on 4th October, after a long illness.



Donald H. White (1921 – 2016)

Taylor was an American composer.

Donald White was born in Narberth, Pennsylvania in 1921. He studied Music Education at Temple University in Philadelphia and composition with Persichetti at the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music (1946) and with Bernard Rogers and Howard Hanson at the Eastman School of Music (1952). In 1947 he joined the faculty of DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana where he was chairman of composition and theory studies (1948–81). He was the director of the school of music at Depauw from 1974-1978. He became the chairman of the music department at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, Washington in 1980.

White died at the age of 95 on October 4, 2016.

The idea was to celebrate the albums 30th with a fresh live sound, the band has never been hotter and truly creates a great take on this classic record, where the songs are just as timeless as the day of it's release, bearing in mind, most of the songs would have been written between 1980 & 1982!

The Daintees showed an incredible range and idiosyncrasy for such young recording artists, and some of the guitar solos John Steel created back then are still etched in the ears of the listener since this truly weird album's release!

It's wonderful hearing his 2nd takes with a 30 year distance, just outrageously good man!

Here the artist gives you a 30 year gap between original and new, with the original guitarist on both albums Mr John Steel, who left the band after its recording, never to surface till some 15 years later, Martin wrote the song 'Goodbye John' for him, which featured on following classic album 'Gladsome, Humour and Blue' for his missing friend

It was Anthony's brother Gary who joined the band in early 1986 to tour the album and then play on the next three of The Daintees major and awesome releases

Also on this new version we have John Steel's wife Kate Stephenson on drums, who has been with the band for over ten years now, worked closely with Sam Brown, Herbie Flowers and Midge Ure before teaming up with Martin and the gang, another weird thing is, Martin's childhood friend and Bassist Christopher Mordey, who only played Bass on Daintees very first single release Roll on Summertime, who also played on Martin's first 1978 demo of 'Neon Skies' recorded at Newcastle's Spectro Art's Centre, so Chris is a hardcore Daintee and is arguably, along with Anthony Dunn, the first Bass player of The Daintees, so has a very authentic and valid connection.



Artist Archie Fisher & Barbara Dickson Title Through The Recent Years Cat No. CTVPCD016 Label Chariot

In 1970, Barbara Dickson and Archie Fisher were invited by Decca Records to record a new album of traditional music. The resulting set, 'Thro' The Recent Years – The Folk Experiences of Archie Fisher and Barbara Dickson,' has since gone on to become an acclaimed collector's item for fans of traditional music but despite its popularity this release marks its first ever release on CD outside of Japan.

Digitally remastered from the original master recordings, 'Thro The Recent Years' features fourteen superb tracks including Bob Dylan's 'Tears of Rage' as well as a selection of new songs by Archie and Scottish folk stalwart Rab Noakes (who also provides guitar and backing vocals on the album.)

'Thro' The Recent Years' is produced by the legendary Ray Horricks whose long career as a producer included albums with Rod Stewart, Sammy Davis, Jr and Anthony Newley.

The CD booklet features a new interview with Barbara in which she looks back over her career in Folk music from her earliest days performing at the Howff in Dunfermline, through to her early recordings and influences and the eventual big break which took her on to become one of the most successful and well-loved singers of her generation.



Artist Archie Fisher & Barbara Dickson Title Orfeo Cat No. CTVPCD015 Label Chariot

Following on from his 1970 album, 'Thro' The Recent Years', recorded with Barbara Dickson, Decca Records invited Archie Fisher to record a follow-up solo set. 'Orfeo' features a mix of traditional songs and self-penned tracks which was ultimately released as Decca SKL 5057 later that year.

Barbara was once again on board, this time providing backing vocals with Rab Noakes, another friend of theirs from the Fife folk scene, playing guitar with Daryl Runswick featuring on bass and Bill Kemp on drums.

The album was produced by Ray Horricks who had been working with Decca Records and a handful of smaller labels throughout the 60's on a wide range of genres including folk albums by artists including Shirley Collins, Moira Anderson and Davey Graham, musical soundtracks and early singles by Rod Stewart, as well as several releases by Kenneth McKellar.

Of the eleven tracks on 'Orfeo', four are traditional with the others being new songs written by Archie. Looking back on the album, Archie comments that the songs were intended to be "very stylised and very chord-orientated and very much built around guitar tunes which were breaking away from the traditional songs and more towards jazz guitar and torch music."

Barbara Dickson also feels that with 'Ofeo' Archie

was keen to break new ground. "He was definitely moving forward musically which was the most important thing I think."

'Orfeo' has been digitally remastered from the original studio master tapes and features detailed CD liner notes on Archie's long career as a traditional music pioneer.

Brown has been lead singer of various groups, most notably The Crazy World of Arthur Brown and Kingdom Come, followed by a varied solo career as well as associations with Hawkwind, The Who, Jimi Hendrix, Klaus Schulze, and Frank Zappa.

When the God of Hellfire returned to the stage in the United Kingdom after a strange anabasis in Texas when, together with Jimmy Carl Black (the Indian in the Mothers) he was painting houses for a living, pundits were surprised how vibrant and relevant he still was as an artist. Any thoughts that he was a novelty one hit wonder from the sixties vanished like the morning mist, and Arthur entranced audiences wherever he went. This show from 2003 will show you exactly what I mean.

The Beatles Tapes from the David Wigg Interviews is an audio album of interviews with each of the four members of The Beatles: John Lennon (with his second wife, Yoko Ono), Paul McCartney, George Harrison, and Ringo Starr. Nils Hilmer Lofgren (born June 21, 1951) is an American rock musician, recording artist, songwriter, and multi-instrumentalist. Along with his work as a solo artist, he is a member of Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band since 1984, a former member of Crazy Horse, and founder/frontman of the band Grin. Lofgren was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame as a member of the E Street Band in 2014. Code of the Road: Greatest Hits Live is an entertaining tear through Lofgren's catalog, featuring most of the guitarist's best-known songs, plus a healthy selection of fan favorites, making it a solid live set for fans.







I never dreamt in my wildest dreams that when I was asked by Ben Nisbett and Micheal Carr if I would like to sing a little song they had written for hopefully a new TV series about White Horses that it would become so popular. I of course said I would be delighted to do so. I then went to Ben's office in Tin Pan Ally (Denmark Street, London) as it was known and heard the song and saw the lyrics for the first time. I must say I fell in love with it We then set the key for the arranger and a week or so later I was in the rather small Studio to put my voice to the arrangement that had already been recorded. It was then I decided to make something of this sweet little song. As there were about two tracks left I used them to double track my voice and put in the harmonies which I knew would work well for the song. Lucky for all of us it was accepted for the TV series and Voila, a little gem was born.

I am quite astounded that my recording of the White Horses theme song is still remembered so fondly and played on the radio so regularly. So many people have written to me personally to recall all the happy memories they remember as children about the series and my Recording. After so many enquiries I am delighted that this album has been released with the White Horses recording and tracks from my White Horses LP along with some other favourites of mine.

It includes one track that has never been released before which was part of an album that I created with Christopher Gunning called Calendar which was very dear to my heart. The Busker was about April showers, the album was never released and to date The Busker is the only track known to have survived. I have also chosen several recordings I made as part of the Raindrops, a vocal quartet with my ex Husband Len Beadle, Vince Hill and Johnny Worth. They all went on to make their own individual contributions to popular music.

I recently saw the entry an old schoolfriend had made on 'Friends Reunited'. Under 'Music' he wrote: "I think that anything released since the beginning of the eighties is shit" and I thought that this was such an appalling thing to say that I decided not to bother renewing our friendship. The fact that the boy who taught me to roll spliffs and introduced me to Joy Division is now a senior policeman also had something to do with it. Because one of the things that I like about my job, indeed my life, is that I am constantly being introduced to new artists, authors

and musicians.

One day a few months ago Rob Ayling copied me into an email exchange with a bloke called Martin in Toronto. It turned out that he is a musician and a visual artist of rare prowess. I asked for more information and both Rob and Martin pointed me towards his website:

"Martin Springett was born in Crayford, Kent, England, in 1947. He studied art (that is he learned







to play the Guitar) for two semesters at the Brassey School of Art in Hastings, Sussex. He emigrated to the West Coast of Canada in 1965, but returned to the UK in 1973 to pursue music in various bands. He spent time in Germany, and toured through Europe.

While in London Martin started to illustrate and design record covers for Columbia records. Upon his return to Vancouver, Martin carried on with music and illustrated various books and magazines. In 1978 he moved to Toronto, maintaining activity in every area where illustration is required. He released his own album, "The Gardening Club", in 1983.

In 1984 Martin was commissioned to illustrate the cover of "The Summer Tree" by Guy Gavriel Kay. This and the subsequent volumes of The Fionavar Tapestry Trilogy were published around the world along with Martin's covers

Martin continued his work in fantasy illustration, illustrating many covers for fantasy novels, including "The Traveller In Black" by John Brunner. In 1990 he illustrated his first childrens book, "Mei Ming and the Dragon's Daughter" written by Lydia Bailey. Martin has just finished illustrating his sixth childrens book, called "The Follower" by Richard Thompson. He has been nominated for various awards, including the Govenor Generals Award For Illustration. He has won the Aurora Award For Excellence in Fantasy Art, and two Silver Awrads from the Art Directors Club of Toronto and Best Classical Record Cover of

The Year Award (UK).

Martin still pursues the Musical Muse, recently producing a new CD, "Blue Evening" with his band "FREEFALL", an independent, instrumental album called "Rough Magic"; a collection of explorations on the guitar, and a collection of tunes inspired by the writings of Guy Gavriel Kay called "Bright Weaving"."

Over the months it also turned out that Martin is a very funny chap (funny as in amusing I mean) and we had a long drawn out and very entertaining exchange of emails. It turned out that we were both fans of Russell Hoban, and that he had been a personal friend of the legendary Pauline Baynes (illustrator of the Narnia books) whom I have greatly admired for many years. And so, when we eventually spoke on the telephone it was like we were old friends, as I hope that this interview shows.

Street Art (and even copyright!)

We often talk about 'being on one side of the fence or the other', and sometimes 'sitting on the fence'. Indeed. Street Art or Graffiti , as it used to be called, has frequently divided opinion. The old debate was about whether it was 'creative or destructive'. Now, I guess, most folk around the world acknowledge, at least to some extent, that there is some incredible art produced on walls, pavements, disused/abused buildings, bridges – buses, trains – in fact, just about anywhere. Here's one of my favourites from Banksy, which is located at the rear of a derelict building on the edge of car park in Galashiels in the Scottish Borders.

There are also some apocryphal tales of walls and doors being ripped away, as art collectors have sought to liberate a 'Banksy' – usually out of profit motive, not because they 'like' the piece.

Here are extracts from a rather wonderful story by Matthew Weaver from the

'Guardian' (15th August 2016), telling the tale of the Folkestone 'double-thefts' of an original Banksy and a Banksy-copy.

"Two men arrested over attempted theft of Banksy copy"

Two men were arrested in Folkestone after a copy of a Banksy graffiti artwork, which was itself the focus of a legal tussle after being ripped from a wall in the Kent town and shipped to the US, was allegedly stolen.

The stencilled work by local street artist Robsci was based on Art Buff, a 2014 work by Banksy which was part of the Folkestone Triennial.

Officers on patrol on Sunday morning spotted two men apparently trying to steal the new work, which had been installed the previous day on a chipboard awning boarding up the garden of a derelict building, west of the town's centre.

Joshua Tyrell, from Guildford in Surrey, has

been charged with drink driving. He was arrested in the early hours of Sunday, and has been bailed to appear in court on 21 September.

A 29-year-old man from Ashford arrested on suspicion of theft was released without charge.

The original, which was valued at almost half a million pounds and is due to be exhibited in Folkestone next year, is safely in storage. Last year a judge ruled the mural should be returned to the place it was originally daubed after it was chiselled out of the wall by the owners of an amusement arcade and sent to a gallery in New York.

The original depicts a woman looking at an empty plinth while listening to headphones. In the copy, a phallic cactus appears on the plinth together with the words 'return to sender'. It is signed 'Robsci by Banksy'.

The legal challenge to return the original

Banksy to Kent was launched by Folkestone arts charity the Creative Foundation, which runs the Folkestone Triennial.

loannis loannou, the Creative Foundation marketing manager, said: 'Our Banksy is in storage safe. It looks like someone has just copied it. Robsci is a local guy who goes around doing graffiti similar to Banksy.' "

The controversy surrounding thefts of Banksy's paintings peaked in 2014 when an exhibition was mounted of the artist's 'stolen' works. It even included video of thefts taking place. Sincura, the company behind the exhibition and sale of works, claims that they are art 'Concierges' – it's highly complex morality! http://stealingbanksy.com/ And, as with many other websites, Sincura claim 'copyright' of all the stolen images. Here's a Banksy image which nicely sums up the moral and ethical confusion. Mine included, given that I have worked for both copyright and ant-



copyright organisations and publications!

And a big thank-you to my good mate, Phil Bayliss for sharing some of his pics from the 2015 Dismaland event on the site of the old Tropicana Swimming Pool in Weston-super-Mare. It was organised and funded by Banksy, with art pieces and installations from 58 friends and artists such as Jimmy Cauty and Damien Hirst. Banksy described the show as, "A family theme park unsuitable for children." A real live 'Bemusement park'!

The BBC reported that the Dismaland park brought a £20 million injection into the rather jaded local economy in the down-at-heel Somerset seaside town. Among the exhibits were a dilapidated fairy castle, a distorted mermaid and a pond of migrant-filled boats. And lots of challenging social, economic and political images. Banksy said of Dismaland that many of the works required, "audience participation".

"A dead princess is only complete when surrounded by gawping crowds with their cameras out, or the opportunity to photograph yourself pulling an amazed expression when a killer whale leaps from a toilet," he added.

Art producer, Kate Cockshaw, commented that, "I hope that Dismaland inspired local politically, socially young people and artistically." The whole event gained an amount of national enormous and international publicity and probably raised the image and profile of Street Art more than any other 'organised' art show has ever managed. And sometimes the simplest Street Art packs the greatest punch.











I usually have a camera with me and I have been taking photos of Street Art for many years. Different locations, different countries. Some are even 'staged events' such as the 'Paint & Beer' weekend in a squatted industrial space in Amsterdam. There, a punk brewery joined forces with musicians and Street Artists from around the world to decorate and entire building over a single weekend. Wonderful stuff!

It's perhaps not so obviously artistic, but you have to agree the men's loo at the Paint & Beer weekend exudes a certain street-chic







charm!

But Street Art has become universal. And many of the artists are now hailed as being at forefront of contemporary art – not just Street Art. Banksy's book, 'Wall and Piece' has become a major international best seller – a coffee table collection of anarchy art, no less! It even includes his 'advice on painting with stencils' which includes these little nuggets of wisdom:

- It's always easier to get forgiveness than permission.
- Mindless vandalism can take a bit of thought.
- Think outside the box, collapse the box and take a fucking knife to it.

Like it or loathe it, Street Art is here to stay, challenge and confront us. Here are a few of the examples I've photographed in London.









Finally, a couple of examples from my friend from Maastricht, Virginie Moerenhout, whose sticker-book, 'Dictator Chips' (crisps, to us in the UK), offered non-artists the opportunity to put up dictator stickers around the world's streets. The humour and double-entendre in much Street Art provides a major part of its fascination.

Live at The King Arthur, Glastonbury, 30/9/16 & The Uffculme Variations CD (Live at Kosfest 2016)

Well, well, well, two great 'new' artists for me in one year, Ryley Walker and now this amazing lady. Thanks to Alan Dearling for the head's up in his recent Gonzo piece on the Kosfest 2016, I took a chance and ordered her superb Tygerland CD from last year. I haven't really stopped playing it since. Almost at the last minute, I noticed she was playing live just an hour down the road and so after work on Friday, we headed south into the Autumn night.

I've always had a soft spot for Glastonbury and it's still 'alternative UK central'. Lots of freaks, old heads and magical weirdness still abound. I haven't been visiting quite as often in the last few years as the record shop and CD store closed down but this pub is just great. Tucked down St Benedict Street, its website proclaims its intension to be a 'community hub' and its staff and locals couldn't have been more friendly. Our request for any food available was met with 'we've had a really busy day man, but we could do you some chicken burgers and chips', which were excellent, lots of salad, salsa and mozzarella. Nice soft drinks too (driving), the locally made Orchid Pig 'Totally Minted' in particular. I plan to go back; they've got some more great gigs coming up over the next few weeks, Sentient (Steffe Sharpstrings from Here and Now plus Mike Howlett from the 'Virgin' Gong), Nik Turner's New Space Ritual and the UK version of the Invisible Opera Company of Tibet to name a few.

Gigs are held in a backroom, which is squareshaped with a long extension to the far side,

six quid for two bands! That's more like it. As we queued to get in, everyone seemed on the guest list but the lady at the door wasn't having any of it. We grabbed the last of the few tables, just on the edge of the room, with a clear view of the stage. The good and great of old Glastonbury town trooped in, with lots of people clearly knowing each other. The support act were a fun duo, Music of the Andys. Two guys (guess their names) who play 'Andiant whirling music from Somerset, Wiltshire and Peru'.....One guy on various keys, the other on electric guitar. They had their moments and Sarah commented afterwards, seemed to have their local fans too. Their Bandcamp site has some samples of their stuff. Their kit was swiftly removed from the stage and Cary and her band were on.

So, who is Cary Grace? Visually, a tall, very elegant American lady with lovely long hair, who moved over here just over ten years ago. She runs a company building bespoke analogue synthesisers amongst her many other talents. Live she sings, plays synth (VCS3) and for one song, a 12 string acoustic. Her excellent band including Andy Budge on Rickenbacker and Gibson basses, David Payne on drums, Owen Hutchings on lead guitar plus Victoria Reyes on keys, oboe and backing vocals. I didn't even realise she was there for the first 15 minutes or so until I heard an instrument I couldn't see, she was tucked behind the right hand speakers. As usual for me, the (female) vocals were not super clear, which surprised me as, as far as I could work



out most of the band were not being piped thru the PA. However the two speaker stacks were angled in at 45 degrees and we were sitting to the right. I suspect her voice may have been much clearer within the speaker arc. They played a full 90 minute set and from a comment one of the Andys made, the evening was recorded and filmed. I just noticed on FB Hawkwind's legendary dancer Stacia was looking for a lift to the gig....wonder if she made it?

Without any ado, we were off, the first number familiar to me, coming from Tygerland. In addition to Cary herself, the two star players for me were Andy's great and fluid bass work and Owen's excellent guitar play. Both Tgyerland and the new album feature Steffe Sharpstrings who is an amazing guitar player, Owen however was no slouch himself, playing some lovely stuff. The great thing about Cary and her music is its freshness and originality, it's hard to describe it in words. The music 'conventional-type varies from song structures' to more extended 'soundscape' pieces. Like her voice, the music ebbs and flows in a way that is just right. The whole ensemble sounded tight throughout, which is impressive for a band that doesn't seem to play live that often. If you like early Floyd/ Gong, early Genesis even, I think you will love this as much as I do already. Her voice ranges





from light and high but can go deeper and roar on heavier tracks like War Child. As I mentioned, her voice was a bit swamped at times by the band from where we were sitting but as the set went on they really started to cook and on a slower-paced number her voice really started to soar. Whilst Ryley Walker's music clearly sounds somewhat derivative (in a good way) from his influences, Cary is very much 21st century. Most of her material is selfpenned too, almost all of the lyrics for example.

Even in the space-time continuum that is Glastonbury, one has to obey today's sound curfews and all of a sudden, time was nearly up.

No time for an 'encore' but a rousing version of Bowie's Queen Bitch nicely rolled up the proceedings, after which it was 22.59, only a minute to go. She mentioned her new CD was available from the sound desk, due to be officially released at the end of the month, so I happily paid my tenner and we went out into the night and headed home, a very warm glow inside.

I can't see any more future gigs on her website or FB apart from next summer's 'Sendelica' bash in Cardigan, West Wales (4-6 August 2017) at the moment, but fear not, just order her new CD, The Uffculme Variations. Recorded earlier this year, with Steffe on guitar and Graham Clark on violin joining her regular band members. This kicks off with Orange Sky (from Tygerland), a slow burner with her voice soaring into the summer sun, pure aural delight. A much more up-tempo number follows, Trouble. Kozmik Eye is a much longer piece, some gliss guitar from Steffe, a nice rolling groove from Andy and David, the violin comes in for a bit and then Steffe's turn to go heavenward, some great orgasm guitar work, synths and keys, female vocals swirling around at one point. Graham's electric violin comes in again, a certain N Kennedy springs to mind. This is music to get lost in, it just sweeps you away.

The title track is next, Steffe flying high yet again. This is what summer festivals should be all about, superb musicians jamming. Cassiopeia is the penultimate number, a lighter more jazzy piece, Steffe playing some nice choppy chords, Graham flying high this time, Cary's VCS3 swirling in and out and around. The Grand Theme of Things closes the album, a slower number, Steffe back up in the stratosphere, Cary's voice with a touch of echo, all building up to a cosmic crescendo. (This last one is on her homepage to listen to as a taster).

The number of female musicians has rocketed in recent years, a good thing in principle, but in my humble opinion, most of them sadly are a waste of space, 'me too', can't really sing, too many short skirts and cleavages. Interestingly, I see Ms Bush is finally releasing a Live set from the London shows in 2014, which I felt was the most self-indulgent drivel I'd ever heard. I've pre-ordered the triple CD package for my other half. I'll give it a listen to make sure I didn't get it wrong (I suspect it will be very polished, overdubbed etc rather than 'raw live'). In the meantime, this lady is a totally unique and refreshing talent, and has chosen to base herself amongst us, here in Blighty...new music isn't entirely dead after all it seems.

If you buy one new album this year, start with Tygerland, it's a modern psychedelic classic, I bet you don't stop there either. Me, I'm about to order more from her back catalogue......enjoy!

But this was (mostly) intentional, because it's precisely how Digitiser itself was run. They might have been orchestrated chaos, but the pages of Britain's foremost teletext video games magazine were never uninteresting. Mr Biffo himself admitted he experienced night terrors in which not a single person attended Block Party 2016. But by the time he arrived at the real life venue in Cambridge, a six-strong team of dedicated helper chimps was already transforming the classroom area into a geek cave for daytime activities.

After a life spent in and around music Roy Weard has finally written it all down. From his beginnings in the folk clubs of the early sixties, to playing the free festivals of the seventies with his own band 'Wooden Lion', to touring as a merchandiser with acts like Santana, The Pink Floyd and Genesis, to fronting cult London bands 'Dogwatch' and 'Roy Weard and Last Post', then touring again as a sound engineer and tour manager for many different bands and solo acts. A wide and varied life this book spans all of that and more and is freely sprinkled with backstage stories and tales of a life spent on many different roads. It also contains many photographs, mostly taken by Roy, the crews he toured with, or by the fans of his various bands.

Even now he is unable to give up being involved in music. He still fronts the revived band 'That Legendary Wooden Lion', is part of the team that puts on monthly gigs in Brighton and Hove under the name of 'The Real Music Club' and does a weekly one hour radio show on Tuesdays at 4pm on Brighton and Hove Community Radio. As of now, he also writes a regular column in this august publication.. also got a call from *Accept*. They were one of the few German bands, along with *The Scorpions* who were acknowledged outside Germany. A straight up metal band consisting of guitar, bass, drums and vocals whose most famous song seemed to be 'Balls To The Wall'. Frank suggested I mixed front of house and he did monitors, but I said that was silly. He really liked the band and I thought he should do the front sound. He was not convinced he was good enough to do it, but I talked him round and we went out to do a few gigs.

I was doing the monitors on the side of the stage on the first gig when I noticed that Udo, the band's singer, bore more than a passing resemblance to Les Dawson. I think it was the way he pursed his lips when he was not singing, but I had a lasting impression of Les Dawson doing his middle-aged housewife act, hoiking on his bra strap and singing 'I've got my balls to ze vall' – cracked me up every night.

The band liked Frank and he did a great job on the sound (as I knew he would) so we got their next tour. The support act for this was a band called *Vicious Rumours* from San Francisco. I was recording the *A ccept* set on the tour on an array of ADAT machines for release as a live album (I don't know if it ever came out) and mixing the front for *Vicious Rumours*. Frank wanted a lighting designer for the tour and I suggested Simon Rickman, who had been LD for Manfred. As a result of this Simon and I wound up going on a short European tour with *Vicious Rumours*.

Their 1996 tour was to promote a new album, 'Something Burning', but the band's lead singer Carl Albert had just died in a car accident, and lead guitarist and band leader, Geoff Thorpe, had taken over vocals. I thought the band was pretty good, but for some reason, the band's fans were not willing to follow this and the tour was very under-attended. The gigs in northern Germany were OK, but as we travelled south audiences grew thinner. In Lütterwitzt we reached a real low point. This was a town that had been formerly in East Germany before the re-unification, and even though most of the former East Germany was now slowly clawing its way out of monochrome, this place had been bypassed. The gig itself was the solitary building in a sea of grey, overcast skies and ploughed fields.



It did not get any better once inside either. The toilets were rank and there was no hot water - or hot anything for that matter. The hall was dark and musty smelling and that all-pervasive East German fog seemed to creep in through walls. Soundcheck over, we sat backstage and had a bite to eat - from the cold buffet - before venturing outside to man our stations for the gig. As we approached the doors that led out into the hall we knew it was not right. The usual hubbub was not there, and when we opened the doors we could see why. There was no audience. 12 people at the most in a hall which would hold 800. Maybe they were in a bar that we had not seen before I thought, but I was not convinced. I remembered one of Harley's tour managers explaining why the hall was pretty empty about half hour before the show.

'They are all upstairs in the venue's bar,' he said, 'as soon as you start playing they'll come rushing in like flies round shit.'

Steve had not been impressed by this analogy.

That time it was true, and by the time I cranked up the intro music the hall was heaving - this time, I felt, was different. The band took to the stage and bravely did their whole set to the 12 people who stood staring, open mouthed, at a full on heavy rock band, with wall to wall amps and massive double drum kit, performing to an empty hall with all the bravado of a band playing to a packed stadium. When they finished the last number and retired to the dressing room, Simon and I just looked at each other. Two nights before, playing in a gig the size of someone's living room, with toytown desks and miniscule sound and lighting equipment we had looked at each other and said, 'What am I doing here?'

This time we knew what to do. We got down from the desks, walked over to the tiny audience, shook each of them firmly by the hand and said, 'Thank you for coming to our little show.'

They did not understand that either.

It was during this tour that my first daughter, Jemima, gave birth to my grandson, Ashley. I became a grandfather, but felt I got away with having to grow up because of it - by being on tour when it happened.

'What does granddad do?'

'He is on tour in Europe with an American Metal Band'

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However, although the vast majority of the time it was either Richard or me, or occasionally both of us on stage, occasionally we were replaced for a few minutes by one or another local worthies, and one of these aforementioned 'local worthies' was the President of a local science fiction society. Waddling onto the stage in a haze of selfimportance he arrived on stage with the opening lines: "I doubt if there is anyone here who is unaware of the media sensation that is Harry Potter" he said with a portentous little cough.

A year or so later, whilst laid up in bed with a particularly nasty cold, one of Richard's friends leant me the first few Harry Potter books, and much to my surprise, I actually enjoyed them very much. Over the years I read all the rest of the books as they came out, and saw all the films. The final book actually came out on the day that Corinna and I got married in 2007, and the final films arrived a few years later.

One of the things that most impressed me about the structure of the series was that J K Rowling had not only mapped out an interesting story over seven books, but had originally planned that these books should be released over a period of seven years. The idea was that an eleven year old child who read the first book, would be just about to leave school when the series finished. And that each book would be more 'grown up' than the previous one, with successive amounts of romance, sex and violence as successive amounts of hormones coursed through the veins and therefore the internal organs of its readership.

Rowling always said that the series was complete in itself, and that there would be no more books in the series. And for some years she kept to it. Now, however, nearly two decades since *Harry Potter* and the Philosopher's Stone was published, the Harry Potter machine has rolled back into action. There has been a Harry Potter stage play in two parts first staged a few months back. Both parts of the stage play's script have been released in print and digital formats as *Harry Potter and the Cursed Child Parts I & II.* The first edition, entitled "Special Rehearsal Edition", corresponded to the script used in the preview shows and was scheduled to be published on 31 July 2016, the date of Harry's birthday in the series and Rowling's birthday, as well. Since revisions to the script continued after the book was printed, an edited version will be released in 2017 as the "Definitive Collector's Edition". According to CNN, this was the most preordered book of 2016.

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There is another three part movie series (not actually featuring the characters of the Harry Potter books and movies, but set in the same universe) which will presumably spawn an accompanying novelisation, and the other evening, whilst slightly in my cups, I found some new Harry Potter books on iBooks, and as they retailed at an awesome £1.99, I bought them.

And guess what? They are not terribly good. In fact they are bordering on the tawdry. They have been pulled from the Pottermore website with a few bits and bobs of commentary from JKR herself. Pottermore is the digital publishing, ecommerce, entertainment and news company from J.K. Rowling and is the global digital publisher of Harry Potter and J.K. Rowling's Wizarding World. It offers news, features, and articles as well as new and previously unreleased writing by J.K. Rowling. The site features Rowling's thoughts, several pages of unpublished text, and a sales resource for ebook and audiobook versions of the seven Harry Potter novels.

These three little books are, of course, quite entertaining and fill in some of the gaps in the backstory which are quite nice to know if one is interested in the HP universe. But they are more than slightly flimsy, and - even with the best will in the world - it is hard to describe them as being value for money.

These books will have sold enormous numbers, and will have made an awful lot more money, for an ever growing franchise which has made an awful lot of money already. These books were entertaining enough, but unlike the original seven novels, and the eight movies which they spawned, they leave a slightly unpleasant taste in one's mouth. Am I aware of the "Media Sensation that is Harry Potter"? Yes. I am afraid that I am, and I like it less than I thought that I did.

This book, released by which was Gonzo last year is erudite an catalogue of some of the most peculiar records ever made. The authors have lined up, described and put into context 500 "albums" in the expectation that those of you who can't help yourselves when it comes to finding and collecting music will benefit from these efforts in two ways.

- Firstly, you'll know you are not alone.
- Secondly, we hope that some of the work leads you to new discoveries, and makes your life slightly better as a result.

We are not seriously suggesting that everyone motivated to wander these pages in search of audio thrills actually tracks down and digests every note of this 12 track tour of the varied peals and solitary sounds of a the bells in a specific Russian Monastery, as recorded in 1991. However, we are using the album to make two important points about all such recordings. Firstly, the world is awash with strange and sincerely meant recordings of any and every noise you might ever desire to hear. There's an obvious appeal (okay, we promise, no more of those puns!) for church bell recordings because lovers of the sound know and appreciate the variations from one belfry to another. A number of such recordings have done sterling work, selling to this specialist market and generating the cash to sustain the very bells featured on the recordings.

The second point worth making is that the many field recordings, within which one church, one nature reserve etc. is captured in various guises and edited into some semblance of a varied long playing recording, have long been a staple of thrift/charity store bins. Some of those consuming them have employed sampling equipment to rework the original sounds into guises their original owners couldn't have imagined. To ignore the existence of this market in a book that aims to chart eclectic albums in all their forms, would have been an injustice. Even a cursory Google will show you a plethora of places online offering mp3 samples and knowledgeable comment with regard to church bells, each with their own story. The particular is obscure eastern bloc gem discussed here is an object lesson in varying moods and textures, the mournful "Chime on Carrying-Out the Cross" being a particular highlight and proof, if it were needed, that an instrumental featuring only bells in a belfry can still hold a narrative. There's another story regarding the way this album made it to the authors of this book after being donated by an individual who had acquired whilst on a trip from Kent to Russia, a trip he undertook to facilitate a deal whereby people in Dartford would liaise with those in Russia so the English could teach the Russians a thing or two about refrigeration! But, that's one for another book.

Rock 'n' Roll and UFOs is an anthology of music from Gregg Kofi Brown's career and contains previous unreleased songs, remixes and demos, with many guest musicians and artists such as Sting guitarist Dominic Miller, Bomb da Bass, Osibisa, the cast of the Who's *Tommy*, The Chimes' Pauline Henry, the Who's former keyboard guru John Rabbit Bundrick and Seal guitarist Gus Isidore.

The CD is a companion to Gregg Kofi Brown's **autobiography** of the same name which covers his early career in Los Angeles and London. From his first pro tour with **Joe Cocker** and **Eric Burdon** to close encounters of a third kind in a California desert and his adventures touring the world with African rock pioneers **Osibisa**. His journey includes starring in hit west end productions in London, recording and touring with infamous rock bands like Hanoi Rocks and the Members.

His first tour in Gambia and Senegal West Africa supporting African superstar **Youssou N'dour** is well documented, as is his work in the African and West Indian music scene in the UK.

The last few years has seen Kofi perform with Damon Alban's African Express and collaborate live with Amadou & Mariam featuring Beth Orton.
